Many of the remaining delegates, while not legally instructed, nevertheless preserve various allegiances to such an extent that here is little likelihood that they can be stampeded in sufficient numbers to cominate anyone.

Moreover, there is a strong possibility that an actual majority of delegates will be instructed, thereby making a tampede an impossibility. In states yet to chose their delegations there are possibilities that 167 delegates will be instructed. These, added to the 338 already instructed, would constitute 505 instructed delegates out of 985 delegates in all.
