your attention specifically to this case, just to show you where Kuykendall lied when he said he did not know what had become of that verdict, and I just as soon see him right here. Eighteen Year Old Boys Join the Colors Today

LONDON, May 10.—Beginning today the last of Great Britain's single men, eligible for army service, began to get into khaki.

In all sections of the country young men of 18 years of age reported at supply depots and changed their civilian raiment for army duds. They will remain in training until they have reached the age of 19, at which time they will be subject to service in actual warfare.

With the first drafts reporting today, it is expected that within a month every eligible single man, whether at-

tested under the Derby recruiting scheme or liable for service under the Conscription Act, will have left civilian pursuits for war duty.

Carrying out pledges to the married eligibles, made in the house of commons, the government is rapidly digging out single men from munition factories and other governmental positions. They are being replaced by women.

The first group of married men who attested for service under the Derby plan are now beginning to assume the appearance of trained troops. They have been in service more than a month. Their ages range from 19 to 26.

European Diplomats State Chinese Dissolution Near

LONDON, May 10.—Declaration of its independence by the Chinese province of Kwangtung is regarded here as an almost certain forerunner of China's breakup into a northern and southern nation.

It was believed Yuan Shi Kai might, by sweeping concessions, hold the country together. Kwangtung having cut loose, however, this is deemed possible. The other rebel provinces are considered certain to cast in their lot with Kwangtung.

The split between north and south is looked for along the line of the Yangtze river. Yuan may make the north a monarchy. The south is expected to be a republic.

Best judges of the oriental situation do not think Yuan will make much effort to fight the south. They point out that he stands an excellent chance

of establishing his power permanently in the northern provinces if he devotes himself to them alone, while an attempt to subdue the south unquestionably would precipitate a bloody war.
