UNDERWOOD VS. FACTS

SENATOR OSCAR UNDERWOOD stands pat on his tariff law. In an interview in the American Magazine, he says: "The talk of our needing a higher tariff to meet after-war conditions has no merit beyond being a political argument." The interview occupies about a half page of the magazine, and in that brief space there are more inconsistencies than were ever crowded into an interview of similar length.

Speaking of the object of his bill to provide a revenue tariff, he says: "You know, if you were to start a moving picture show and charge three dollars a seat, you probably could not pay expenses, but at ten cents a seat you might take in enough dimes to show a good profit." That illustration immediately follows his declaration that the "war shut off foreign competition, but there was no danger from that source." If there was no danger from foreign competition how was it expected to raise increased revenues by the exaction of lower duties. The very purpose of his bill was to encourage importation of goods to such a point that they might compete favorably with American goods. He asserted it time and time again on the floor of the house. Then he says that the great trouble with the war was that it shut off a vast amount of tariff revenue.

But the war is not altogether to blame for that, nor can the amount be called vast. In his annual report for 1914 the secretary of the treasury estimated a revenue of \$220,000,000 from customs for the fiscal year 1915, and we collected \$209,000,000. The volume of imports now coming into this country is the greatest in our history, but they are mainly duty-free goods. Even Mr. Redfield admits that the decrease in customs is due to the increased amount of products which come in without paying revenue to the government.

Mr. Underwood thinks there is no danger in competition with European countries after the war, because there will be fewer men return to the mills, and that it will cause wages to rise; hence there will be less difference than heretofore in the labor cost of production. He thinks the balance of trade will continue in our favor after peace is declared. To see a democrat resort to republican phrases of argumentation such as "labor cost of production," and "favorable balance of trade" in defending a tariff law which was professedly written "without a line of protection in it," and on a competitive basis which could not possibly have given the slightest consideration to a favorable trade balance, would be laughable were the subject less serious.

It is quite evident that when Underwood entered the senate he went into retirement as an authority on trade, even from the democratic standpoint. That he does not keep up with the subject is apparent, because no student of trade would make statements such as those recently uttered by him, if he had in mind the wonderful trade transformations which are taking place in Europe today. Thousands of women have entered the factories and seem to be ably filling the places vacated by the men now at the front. If economy is to be the watchword in Europe, and it undoubtedly will be for years after the close of the war, any demand for labor will meet a supply recruited from the ranks of female operatives.

Women Consider New Party To Fight the Democrats

SALT LAKE CITY, May 1.—Women voters of the country here today considered whether the pen, after all, really is mightier than the sword. Unless the pen shows results shortly they say they are going to declare war with the political sword on the democratic party.

This was the decision contemplated by the conference. They threaten to organize a woman's party, which they claim will hold the balance of power in the November election, and fight the democrats—unless the democrats "come across."

Cruelty to that child of the suffragists, the national amendment enfranchising women, is the charge laid by the delegates against democrats who have held the amendment in contempt, and threaten to keep it there. If the child is not dressed in a new cloak of approval by committeemen and brought before the house for consideration—favorable consideration—this summer, the women say there will be new hands in the congressional pork barrel after November.

A delegation of women will be sent on to Washington to deliver this message. They will be on a suffrage special, with twenty-three envoys who just wound up a tour of suffrage states, whipping the women into line. They will be met at Washington by crowds of supporters. The biggest

WOMAN LIVES ON A DIME PER DAY

HAMPERED BY SICKNESS, HER INCOME HAS NOT BEEN OVER TEN CENTS DAILY—AND SHE HAS MADE IT DO

BARBERTON, Ohio, May 11.—Orim necessity and Mrs. Cretia McIntyre, 62, have battered the high cost of living down to ten cents a day. This dime covers food, clothing, fuel and other necessities of life. Since November 14, 1915, Mrs. McIntyre's income has averaged ten cents a day.

Though hindered by rheumatism, she makes her own way, sewing, washing and peddling household articles. Despite her financial handicap, Mrs. McIntyre is cheerful. She said today:

"I will make more this summer, when my rheumatism is better and I can work faster. I guess I can stand it a little longer. I'm not going to live to be as old as Methuselah."

She has struggled with adversity for twenty-eight years. Her diet consists chiefly of rolled oats, cornmeal and skimmed milk at five cents a gallon.

Mrs. McIntyre makes herself oatmeal pancakes in the morning. What is left she fries in the evening and makes some corn mush, which she eats with a little skimmed milk. Occasionally she has an egg. In the last six months this economist has spent \$1 for coal and \$1.50 for kindling wood.
