WHY EXPERIMENT?

THAT a man is not appreciated at home is too often the case, but in the case of Vernon A. Forbes, present representative of this district, it is delightfully different. A delegation of twelve prominent men of Crook county, each a delegate from some commercial club or other development organization, visited Klamath Falls today, and they put in some earnest and most effective work for this progressive Bend attorney.

Klamath Falls is not the only town they have visited. They are making an automobile tour of the entire Twenty-First District, meeting all of the voters, and speaking of Forbes and his splendid capabilities all of the time. They are reminding the voters of the untiring efforts Forbes has put forth at the past two sessions of the legislature for the benefit of Central Oregon, and the recalling of his splendid work is enough to convince even the most skeptical that at such a time as this, with Central Oregon on the eve of railroad and irrigation development, it is folly to handicap the march of progress by any but the best representation at the coming assembly.

AMERICANS KILL THREE MEXICANS IN A SKIRMISH

ATTACK ON RANCH REPULSED BY TROOPS

General Scott Presents His Report to the War Department, and Administration is Still Hopeful of Bringing About a Satisfactory Adjustment of Affairs With the Carranza Government.

LAGUNA DE TASCALTE, Mexico, May 6.—A platoon of American troops under command of Lieutenant George Patton killed three Mexicans when they attacked the Rubio ranch Sunday night. None of the Americans were injured.

The dead included Julio Cardenas, one of the Villista captains.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 8.—General Scott has presented Secretary of War Baker with information which will be helpful in guiding the future American course in Mexico. He stated that while General Obregon refused to put his promise of co-operation in writing, he offered assistance which will be helpful if there is no outbreak by detached Carranza garrisons.

As a result of Scott's report, the administration is very optimistic regarding the settlement of the Mexican difficulty.

My personal attitude is one averse to anything which might be termed of a spectacular nature. I do not desire to arrest any individual without due cause, or for the sake of such notoriety to the office as might arise. On the other hand, necessity arising, absolutely no favoritism may be expected. I am for a strict enforcement of the law, but I am opposed to any absurd technicality which would permit harassment of any individual lacking influence and means of defense possessed by others. Prosecution for the sake of merely making a record for conviction has, to my mind, been one of the greatest fallacies in connection with the police power. I desire to guard against injustice as well as to serve justice, and to that end I shall continue to observe the strict spirit of the law, regardless of those whom it may affect. My platform is as follows:

- If I am nominated and elected I will, during my term of office, construe my oath of office to mean a complete and efficient enforcement of the law.
 - I will have no interest to serve but the public interest.
 - I will give the protection of my office to all persons, and all classes alike.
 - I will personally conduct my office with strict regard to economy.
 - I will at all times serve all official papers with promptness.
 - I will give all prisoners in my custody humane treatment, wholesome food and clean quarters.
