Wilson's Picture Gets No Applause from English

FLUSHING, Holland, April 25.—(Delayed)—From the deck of the Dutch boat *Wilhelmina* on the North Sea I heard the attack of British naval forces on the German submarine and air base of Zebrugge yesterday.

From various fronts I have heard, at close range, the roars of many guns of all sizes; at the second battle of Ypres, a year ago, it seemed that the clamor of the cannon was the greatest noise that human beings could ever produce. But the tumult of the British naval guns which I heard yesterday shook air, water and earth.

We were approaching the Dutch coast when the uproar began. The firing was perhaps twenty miles distant. Once or twice, when the wind came right, we could hear the shriek of shells. It seemed to the passengers—and sailors who had been near enough to other noisy sea engagements told our belief was correct—that the smoke from the stacks of our boat staggered, hesitated and then vibrated curiously with the air waves which the great guns had sent out.

Meanwhile, though we could see none of the fighting from our low deck there was a group of North Sea pilots in the port of Flushing, which we were approaching, who, standing on a high building in that town, saw a flock of British ships near Zebrugge. The buildings in Flushing were being shaken by vibrations and the windows were broken. These men saw three German boats put out from Zebrugge, flanking the British boats.

Within a few minutes they saw a high puff of black smoke where the German boats had been, and when the smoke cleared away, there were only two German boats left, and they had turned back to Zebrugge.

When we arrived at Flushing in the late afternoon we saw along the high shores, crowds of Flushingites, many with telescopes, looking the twenty or more miles across the mouth of the Scheldt toward the engagement, but a haze had settled down; moreover, the firing had ceased. The engagement was over for the day.

At 4 o'clock this morning an earthquake seemed to shake Flushing. The great guns were going again. San Franciscans, on the morning of the quake, couldn't have awakened more suddenly than the residents of Flushing. Picture a terrific thunder storm with yourself up in the clouds in the very heart of the thunder, and you

Commonwealth Meeting Is Set for the Autumn

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene May 18.—The next commonwealth conference will be held at the University probably about the first week in November. Six Oregon problems are to be on the program, and "the first step will be organization of a campaign of investigation for getting such clear and full light on each of these problems as will lead to safe, prompt and large scale action," said F. G. Young, professor of sociology in the University and director of the conference.

The six problems are:
1.—Application of most available water powers in a fertilizer and explosives industry.

2.—Attraction to state of capital on liberal and safe terms of credit through the agency of national, state and private credit systems.

3.—Elimination to lowest minimum of unemployment through adoption of labor exchanges and co-operation of public and private enterprises in regularizing industry.

4.—Cultivation in every community of spirit and ambition toward securing systematic and far reaching planning for the attainments of its highest possibilities.

5.—Organization of budgets and general administration in each city and

county, and in the state as a whole, for realizing best economy and efficiency.

6.—Encouragement and aid to best talent of its youth to aspire to largest community and commonwealth service.

"The one purpose of the commonwealth service movement is to get the largest possible proportion of the people of Oregon to do creative thinking, on the problem of making the most and best of their state," said Mr. Young.
