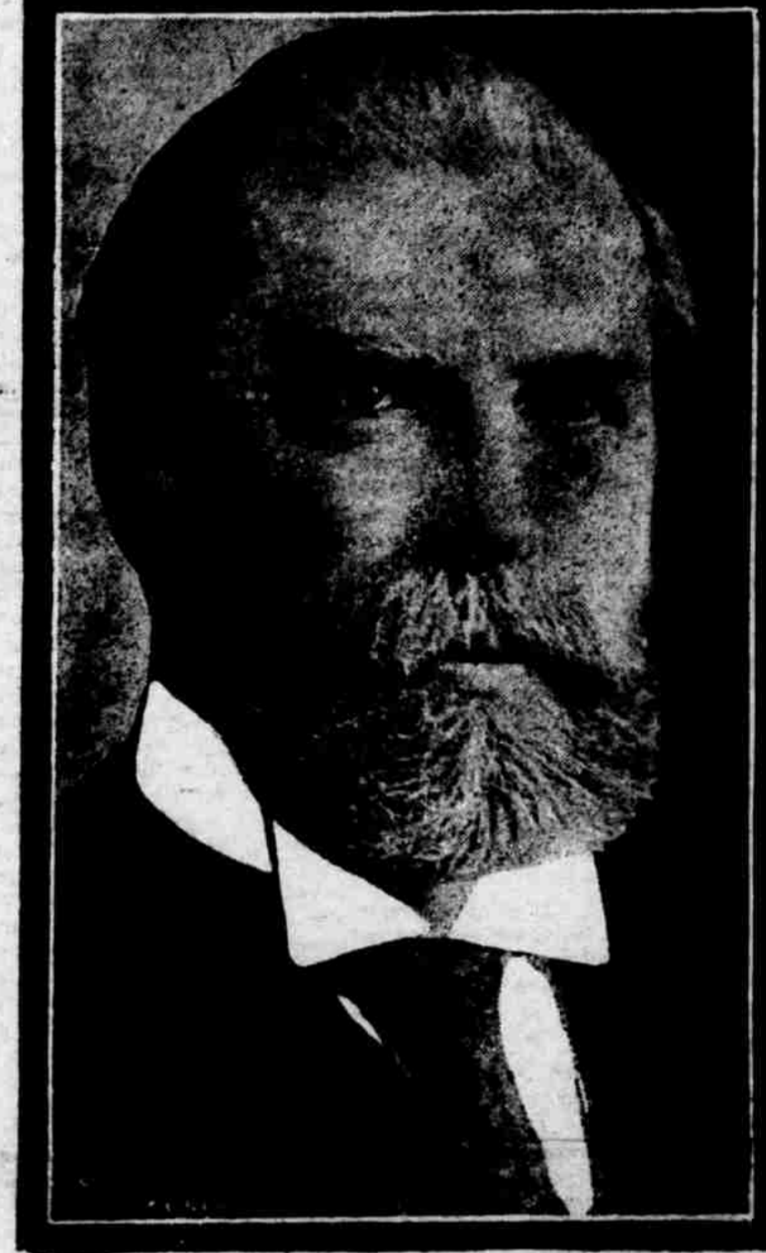

UNION COUNTY MAN IS THE NOMINEE FOR THE COMMISSION

Pat McArthur is Assured of the Republican Congressional Nomination in the Third District With Lafferty a Good Second—Butchell Wins Easily Over Public Service Commissioner Campbell.

United Press Service PORTLAND, May 20.—Returns from all over the state up to 2 o'clock today give Justice Charles Hughes more votes as presidential nominee than all of the other contestants combined. At 2:15 the standing was:

Hughes 12,682, Cummings 6,001, Burton 2,421, Roosevelt 68. Owing to the length of the ballot the returns are slower than usual at this primary. It is estimated that 150,000 votes were cast. Evidently the republican "silent vote" favored Hughes. Ben S. Olcott defeated Moores for the republican nomination as secretary of state by a substantial majority. Returns at 2 o'clock this afternoon from twenty-five counties give Moores 10,883, Olcott 12,676.

Ed Wright of Union county has apparently won the public service commissionership for the Eastern Oregon district over his five opponents. McArthur and Corey are running close for second place. In the Western district, Butchell easily defeated Campbell, incumbent. C. N. McArthur was renominated for congress in the third district. Lafferty was a close second and Littlefield a poor third.
