THE GODEN FLEECE

WE HAVE always talked diversified farming and it is now a pretty generally established fact that a small farmer to be successful must practice this method. A small farmer who bought ten ewes last year calls our attention to his splendid profit for one year. He paid \$70.00 for the ten ewes and it cost him \$2.50 a head, or \$25.00, for their maintenance for one year, which covered interest on money, shearing, cost of feed, etc.; total cost for the ten ewes, \$95.00. The ten ewes dropped ten lambs, which sold for \$6.00 a head, \$60.00; the ewes sheared 100 pounds of wool, for which he received \$35.00, a total of \$95.00, which exactly pays for the ten ewes and their upkeep, leaving them clear at the end of the year. Of course everybody realizes that sheep and wool are very high at the present time, but if we should take an average of same in ten years we might find a result something like the following: Ten ewes at \$3.50 a head, \$35.00; maintenance, \$25.00; total, \$60.00. Ten lambs at \$3.00 a head, \$30.00; 100 pounds of wool at 12c; \$12.00; total, \$42.00, which, under these less favorable circumstances, would leave the farmer ten ewes costing him only \$12.00. From the above facts it would seem as if every small farmer should have a few well-bred ewes on his place.—Portland Livestock Reporter.

SAVE THE RURAL VILLAGE

AS DEVELOPMENT is going on in the United States today rural villages are losing in population while the cities, large and small, are growing in population, wealth and influence. As the villages lose in population they of course lose in wealth and in the attractiveness that only the accumulation of wealth can give. Their merchants are less prosperous, their churches and schools are less efficient, and public spirit, like private initiative, is at a low ebb.

The small village is easily aroused if only a few energetic leaders take matters in hand; certainly, of all communities, it is most in need of organization and development. It seems strange that fathers who have managed to acquire a competence in a village have no ambition to perpetuate their names and influence in that community by passing the business on to their sons. On the contrary, they commonly utilize their money to educate their sons to go elsewhere to engage in business or to practice their professions.

Of course, the old maxim, "What was good enough for me is good enough for my son," is obsolete; the new maxim is, "What was the best we could get in those days as in these was good enough for me, and is good enough for me and my sons." Improvement is the order of the day, and if we want a better place in which to live and carry on our business we ought in the nature of things to make our community that place.

The modern citizen who reads and hears the signs of the times is about one-half for self and one-half for community; he is every bit as much a citizen as he is merchant, farmer or professional man, and he is happier and more prosperous as a result. The other day a merchant in a small city who had always refused to co-operate in local development had a change of heart after hearing an address on community building. As a result, he paid for the dinners of all his clerks at a get together meeting. The speaker who had convinced him was an outsider who had dared to say some things that local merchants had never dared to say. These latter said that to induce that merchant's change of heart was worth to them the entire cost of the community efficiency institute which they had conducted for a week. It is only when merchants and other citizens work together in this way that they acquire the vision to see what their community is capable of.

Chicago Preparing for Women Seeking Ballot

CHICAGO, May 24.—All is in readiness for the thousands of women who will attend the Woman's Party convention here June 5, 6 and 7, in answer to the call of the Congressional Union. Suffragists from all enfranchised states will determine how they can throw their votes in the next election in order to best serve the cause of nation-wide suffrage for women.

The last day of this convention will be the first day of the republican convocation. The Union has just completed an invasion of the West undertaken to consolidate the Congressional Union branches in the already enfranchised states.

The work of organizing the convention is being pushed in every district in Chicago through the women's clubs, societies and industrial organizations. Miss Alice Paul, national chairman, and a notable group of militant scouts are in charge. The activities are directed from "field" headquarters on Michigan boulevard.

Miss Mabel Vernon of Delaware, who organized nearly half the enfranchised states in support of the federal amendment, will arrive soon to direct a campaign of street meetings.

Miss Doris Stevens, head of the national organization department, is here in charge of the open air demonstrations and mass meetings that will punctuate the suffrage calendar between now and convention time.

Miss Elizabeth Elder of Philadelphia has taken charge of the information bureau and will later enroll all delegates. The work of directing the out-of-door publicity is in the hands of Miss S. Ada Flatman of London, England, one of Mrs. Pankhurst's lieutenants in the early days of the militant movement.

The program will be mainly in the hands of the voting women. Among the speakers will be Miss Maude Younger, member of the National Advisory Council of the Union; Mrs. Rard Field, envoy from the woman voters convention in San Francisco, and Mrs. William Kent, member of the national executive committee, all of California; Miss Anne Martin of Nevada, member of the national legislative committee, and Mrs. Dora Phelps Buell, state factory inspector of Colorado and a member of the National Advisory Council of the Union.

A hospitality committee headed by Mrs. Clifford Wells, a prominent society woman, is in charge of the work of securing accommodations for the hosts who will begin to arrive in a few days. Unable to secure rooms in the fashionable hotels, the committee has leased a number of small suburban hotels.

Contrary to reports that the Union is a partisan organization, Miss Alice Paul, the national chairman, declared today that the organization is strictly non-partisan and is working solely for nation-wide enfranchisement of all women.
