Thirty Thousand Women Guests at Big Luncheon

NEW YORK, May 24.—Perhaps the most striking feature on today's program of the biennial conference of the Federated Women's Clubs of America here is the luncheon, served in the mammoth Seventh Regiment armory, at which Mrs. John Hays Hammond is hostess to 30,000 American club-women and a group of Washington society women.

Mrs. Hammond is not a clubwoman, but because of her work as chairman of the executive council of the women's welfare department of the National Civic Federation, she was made chairman of the advisory committee of the Federation.

"We are not here to entertain in a vacuous way for the giddy, skittish, gabbling women," said Mrs. Hammond today, "but we are entertaining the best and most thoughtful women of the country, many of whom have had to make great personal sacrifices to get here and who are seriously concerned with bettering conditions that so sorely need bettering among us."

"I am particularly interested in the establishment of a World Court such as is now under consideration and in which women and their interests should play a great part."

"History is in the making. Shall it

again chronicle that woman has left her paradise to be guarded solely by the flaming sword? If swords are needed, we must have swords and plenty of them. Events have shown that to be unprepared is to invite disaster, but swords and guns and armament of war are only the primitive needs of a nation.

"The home is the citadel of our national life. To safeguard its strength, to protect its moral soundness, to keep high the glorious banners of our national ideals; these are the duties which call to American women today."

"Men of America, let us give you help. In the name of American womanhood I offer you our service. Take us into your councils as we must certainly share in your sorrows if mistakes be made."

French Mount '75' Guns on Decks of Aeroplanes

PARIS, May 2.—(By mail).—Monster French air cruisers—each mounting one of the famous "soixante-quinze" guns so destructive at Verdun—will be in action against Germany's air forces before many weeks.

Successful experiments with this new terror of the air have just been completed. In all probability Sergeant Aviator Treille Grandseigne, hero of several recent air exploits, will pilot the first of the new battle planes. He has been directing the experiments in which huge aeroplanes have carried "75's" in rehearsal of air engagements.

Although but 26 years of age, Grandseigne has won for himself a most enviable record as a pilot of the first cannon mounted aeroplanes, mounting small guns firing shells much smaller than those of the redoubtable "75's." Grandseigne is the aviator who was cited in the order of the day for dropping eighteen incendiary bombs on a Zepplin off Zebrugges on the night of April 25. He also carries the distinction of being the first pilot of one of the new cannon-carrying aeroplanes to battle an enemy warship.

Departing from Dunkirk about 9:30 on the night of April 14, Grandseigne was greeted with volleys of shrapnel from German warships off Nieuport, Middlekerke and other Belgian coast towns. He continued to Ostend, where he opened fire on two German war-

ships leaving the harbor for Zebrugges. Dropping to within a few hundred feet of the water, Grandseigne allowed his gunner to discharge his full ammunition supply of sixteen shells at one of the vessels and then made his escape. The warship did not sink, but apparently was badly damaged.
