### TAFT PRESIDES AT PEACE MEET

"MILITANT PACIFISTS" OPEN SESSION TO CONSIDER METHOD OF BRINGING ABOUT A LASTING WORLD PEACE

United Press Service: WASHINGTON, D. C., May 28—America's militant pacifists, who, some unfriendly soul remarked, "intend to bring about international peace if they have to beat up the whole world to do it," convened here today for their first national convention, under the banner of the League to Enforce Peace, American Section, Ex-President Taft Presides.

Mr. Taft will begin a series of speeches this afternoon on national policies. George Grafton Williams of Harvard will discuss the Monroe doctrine. Entangling alliances will be dealt with by Talcott Williams of Columbia. John Bates Clark of the Carnegie Peace organization will talk about European conditions.

Other speakers today are: Thomas R. White of Philadelphia, "The League"; Oscar Straus of New York, "Force, a Support of Law"; Edward A. Filena of Boston, "The Soul of the United States"; Hamilton Holt of New York, "Armaments."

The effect of the league on American interests will be subject for discussion at the session this evening. Secretary of War Newton D. Baker will be the principal speaker. Other speakers will be R. G. Rhett of Charleston, S. C., president of the American Chamber of Commerce;

### FINLEY LECTURE ON MONDAY NIGHT

BIOLOGIST OF STATE GAME COMMISSION IS OUT TAKING MOVIES OF KLAMATH COUNTY TROUT, FISHING

A lecture of more than usual interest will be given at the Houston opera house Monday evening, when William L. Finley, biologist of the state fish and game commission, will talk on "Our Children and the Birds." The lecture will be free to the public. It will be illustrated by five reels of motion pictures of wild life in Oregon.

Mr. Finley attained national note as a result of his wild life work. In campaigns waged by the ornithological and humane societies against the use of wild bird plumage for millinery trimmings, he took an active part, and his magazine articles and lectures "On the Trail of the Plume Hunters," illustrated largely with pictures taken in Lower Klamath Lake, won many a convert to the ranks of the wild game protectionists.

Finley is here with Stanley Jewitt and R. Bruce Horsfall, naturalists and motion picture men. Today, in company with Game Warden Stout and W. Paul and S. O. Johnson, the visitors are at Harriman lodge taking motion pictures of the matchless Klamath county rainbow trout fishing. They also expect to film wild ducks nesting while there.
