OUR CHAUTAUQUA

THE attention of Klamath Falls people is drawn to the Chautauqua program for 1916. It is a winner. In looking over the splendid staff of lecturers, interest is especially enlisted at the prospect of hearing Victor Murdock, the fiery insurgent from Kansas, who is today a central figure in our national politics. Another man who gives a man-sized twist to things in general, and to community development in particular is Ernest J. Sias, the home town advocate.

Frederick Vinson Fisher, chief of staff of the lecture bureau of the Panama Pacific International Exposition, one of America's most eloquent platform speakers, delivers to chautauquans an illustrated lecture, brilliant in its idealistic Americanism.

Mrs. Harriette Gun Robertson, the platform's premier lady lecturer, will prove one of the most interesting of the lecture course. Elliott A. Boyd, co-worker with Dr. Gussakus of Chicago, is a man of practical and inspiring idealism.

The musical and entertainment numbers challenge comparison. Wit-opskie's Royal Hungarian Orchestra; Madame Morvillous, mezzo-soprano, accompanied by the Royal Hungarian; the Gullotta trio, vocal and instrumental concert, featuring the renowned concert violinist, Vincenzo Gullotta; the Boston Lyric Opera company, popular and classic selections, presenting the comic opera, "Martha," in costume, Elizabeth de Barrie Gill, harpist, contralto, and clever impersonator; the Ionian Serenaders, entertainers de luxe, who play the accordion with an artistic individuality, sing, mimic and impersonate; S. Platt Jones, himself, and Kekuku's Hawaiian quintet, featuring Joseph Kekuku, the originator of the celebrated steel method of guitar playing.

The Chautauqua dates are June 3 to 8th, inclusive. Season tickets are now on sale. This is a treat well worth while.

SIR EDWARD GREY'S STATEMENT CHANGES WAR BETS

LONDON, May 27.—In consequence of Sir Edward Grey's declaration that there will be no peace until Germany shifts its attitude, Lloyd's war odds have become more irregular. Lloyd's has been offering even money that the conflict will not end this year. The latest odds were three to one that the war will not end during 1916, seven to three that it will not end before April

1, 1917, twenty to one it will end before 1919, four to one that Sweden will not join Germany within six months, two to one that Germany and America will not be at war this month.

The German-American odds reflect the English feeling that a submarine attack on a passenger liner with loss of life would upset President Wilson's settlement and precipitate war. Grey's speech was generally applauded by newspapers.

Pursuant to direction of the Common Council of the city of Klamath Falls, notice is hereby given that bids will be received by the Police Judge of said city at his office in the city hall up to and including Monday evening at 8 o'clock p. m., of June 5th, 1916, for making the proposed improvement on Eleventh street, from Main street northerly to the southerly line of the U. S. government irrigation canal, also from the northerly line of the U. S. government irrigation canal northerly to the intersection of Eleventh street, Upham street and Worden avenue, thence westerly on Upham street to the intersection of Prospect street, including intersections; the proposed improvement to be made includes the grading of said street to establish grade to a width of 35 feet and hard surfacing said street to a width of 35 feet over all, including curbs, with either bitulithic or oil macadam; all of said proposed improvement to be made together with the materials to be used in accordance with plans and specifications of the city engineer on file in the office of the Police Judge of said city, reference thereto is hereby made for further details regarding plans, construction, materials and quantities.

Said improvement will be let in one contract, and bids will be received for bitulithic pavement and for oil macadam, and will be opened for consideration by the Common Council on the 5th day of June, 1916, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. Bidders will be required to submit bids on blanks prepared by the city engineer, and bids will not be considered unless so submitted. Bids may be obtained at the office of the Police Judge.

The successful bidder will be required to give bond in a sum to be fixed by the Common Council for the faithful performance of the contract to be entered into for making said improvement. Each bid must be accompanied by a check, certified by some responsible bank for 5 per cent of the amount bid, as a guarantee that the successful bidder will enter into contract with the city for the making of such improvement, within ten days from the date of the award.

The Common Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids, and to make such improvement on behalf of the city.

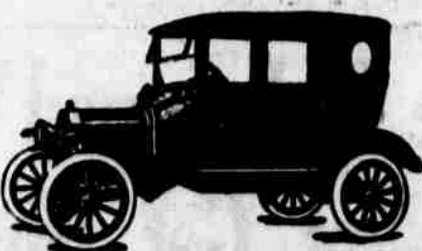
