J., is shown in the upper photograph wearing the official hat of the Congressional Union for Woman Suffrage, the organization of which the energetic and able Miss Alice Paul is the leader in Washington. Hers is a sailor straw but covered with pure white silk. The cost of it was \$5.

Hopkins' looks added considerably to the effect of the hat.

The lower hat is shown on Miss Estma Covert of Chicago. It will be worn by the 30,000 or more women of the National American Woman Suffrage Association who will parade in Chicago for the benefit of the delegates to the national republican convention. This is the organization of which Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt is the leader. It is just a plain straw with a yellow band. The cost was 20 cents.

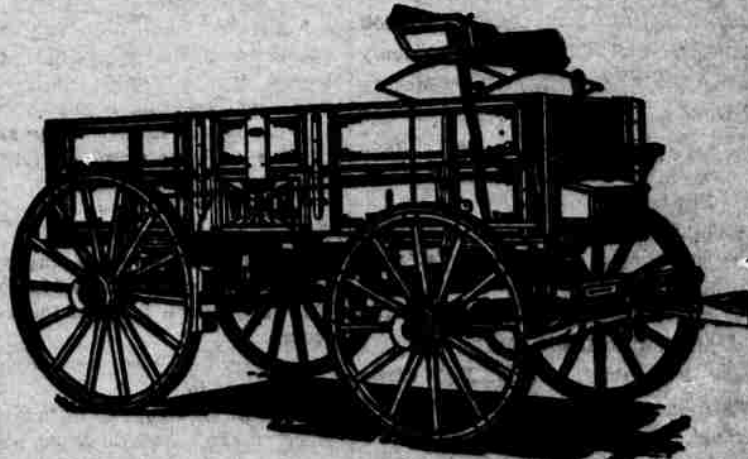

Two Strong Weber Features

AT the rear end of the Weber wagon box you will find two improvements that will mean much to you in the coming years while you use the wagon. There is the International folding end-gate (patent applied for). Split end-gates are now done away with. You will see that it is easy to remove or replace that it will stay in position that it is very strong, made firm by four cross ribs to prevent splitting, and by 5 spring steel bars. Then there is the center link bar rod. This rod occupies the center and has a threaded handle nut on each side of the box. When uncoupled the rod always remains fast to the box. The new link and rod means no more lost or bent rods, and no more stripped threads. You can tighten the rod from either side. Come in and see the handle bar-end arrangement you ever saw.
