

Forest Service Opens More Klamath Land

Announcement is made today by the district forester, Portland, of the classification by the secretary of agriculture of 2,224 acres of land within the Crater national forest, in Southern Oregon, known as the Four Mile Creek project. With the exception of 100 acres, the total area, exclusive of patented and listed lands, is classified as chiefly valuable for forest purposes.

According to the report, the area embraced in the project lies on the east slope of the Cascade range, along the eastern boundary of the national forest, and near the west shore of Upper Klamath Lake. It is approximately thirty miles from the California-Oregon boundary, and Klamath Falls, twenty-five miles distant, is the nearest railroad point. During a portion of the year the tract is accessible by boat transportation, and all the year by good wagon roads. The area is also adjacent to a partly settled community, and 730 acres of patented and listed lands are within the boundaries of the tract.

The report shows that the greater part of the area is unsuited to agricultural pursuits on account of the adverse climatic and topographic features. The altitude varies from 4,150 to 4,180 feet, and steep slopes and canyons are characteristic. During the summer months drying winds are prevalent, the days are hot and the

nights cool, and killing frosts are possible every month of the year. While no records are available, the rainfall is known to be light and the snowfall heavy. Over a large part of the area the soil is a stony, clay loam, and very porous. Aside from a small quantity of hay, it is said that no agriculture has ever been successfully practiced within the tract. In fact, it is claimed that it would be well nigh impossible without irrigation; and irrigation would be both difficult and expensive. On the small area of low level lands, the soil is alluvial clay or alluvial clay loam, and such soils have been used as agricultural.

Furthermore, over 7,000 acres of the area are included within a government timber sale to the Pelican Bay Lumber company, which is now operating on the tract. The timber consists of approximately 135,000,000 feet, made up of Western yellow pine, sugar pine, lodgepole pine, Western white pine, Douglas fir and Shasta red fir. The timber is estimated to run from 8,000 to 50,000 feet per acre.

In view of these facts, the secretary has classified 2,224 acres of the area as chiefly valuable for forest purposes, and 100 acres in sections 8 and 18, in township 38 south, range 6 east, Willamette meridian, as suitable for listing under the act of June 11, 1906. Practically all of this 100 acres, it is said, has already been applied for, and no more applications can be received.
