Pursuant to direction of the Common Council of the city of Klamath Falls, notice is hereby given that bids will be received by the Police Judge of said city at his office in the city hall up to and including Monday evening at 8 o'clock p. m., of June 5th, 1916, for making the proposed improvement on Eleventh street, from Main street northerly to the southerly line of the U. S. government irrigation canal, also from the northerly line of the U. S. government irrigation canal northerly to the intersection of Eleventh street, Upham street and Worden avenue, thence westerly on Upham street to the intersection of Prospect street, including intersections; the proposed improvement to be made includes the grading of said street to establish grade to a width of 25 feet and hard surfacing said street to a width of 25 feet over all, including curbs, with either bitulithic or oil macadam; all of said proposed improvement to be made together with the materials to be used in accordance with plans and specifications of the city engineer on file in the office of the Police Judge of said city, reference thereto is hereby made for further details regarding plans, construction, materials and quantities.

Said improvement will be let in one contract, and bids will be received for bitulithic pavement and for oil macadam, and will be opened for consideration by the Common Council on the 5th day of June, 1916, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. Bidders will be required to submit bids on blanks prepared by the city engineer, and bids will not be considered unless so submitted. Blanks may be obtained at the office of the Police Judge.

The successful bidder will be required to give bond in a sum to be fixed by the Common Council for the faithful performance of the contract to be entered into for making said improvement. Each bid must be accompanied by a check, certified by some responsible bank for 5 per cent of the amount bid, as a guarantee that the successful bidder will enter into contract with the city for the making of such improvement, within ten days from the date of the award.

The Common Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids, and to make such improvement on behalf of the city.

WOMAN MAYOR IS TIRED,
AND IS NOW READY TO QUIT

WARREN, Ill., May 30.—Mrs. Angela R. Canfield, the only woman mayor in Illinois, is ready to quit when her term expires next month. She says she has had a good time, but she's tired of being mayor.

Mrs. Canfield, who runs a millinery shop with which to help out her yearly income of \$12 as mayor of Warren, is going to close out her business and go to Oregon to live.

"Rounding up my boys, the councilmen, was great amusement," Mrs. Canfield said today. "My aldermen decided one night that they did not want to call me mayor, and would rather call me president. I told them that Webster says mayor formerly meant one who kept herds of cattle. They couldn't put anything over on me."

Mosby, Romantic Raider,
Answers Final Summons

had served as member of congress and United States minister to Guatemala.

When the Confederacy called for troops, Mosby enlisted with General J. E. Stuart's First Virginia Cavalry. In Stuart and Mosby the regiment furnished the South two of its famous officers. Stuart, then Colonel Stuart, became cavalry leader for the South, and it was to him that Mosby outlined the plan he had conceived for "Mosby's Men." In the winter of 1862-'63 the plan was completed and launched. Mosby, given a roving commission, circled to the rear of General Burnside, facing that of Lee along the Rappahannock River. His raid there was the first of many that took the heart out of the Union men, who felt the sting of his little band of wasp-like cavalymen.

It was Mosby's plan to hit quick and hard—always from behind, when he was cut off from all help with hostile troops between him and his people. He was captured once, and wounded several times. When he was captured he was sent to Washington. It was a matter of regret for the North that he was soon exchanged and sent back to his army.

After the war—and after General Grant, by his magnanimous order had the order of outlawry against him lifted—Mosby started to practice law in Warrenton, Va. He startled the South when in 1872 he voted for Grant—a hated republican—for president.

WARSHIP EXHIBIT TO
AID NAVAL RECRUITING

NEW YORK, May 30.—To educate the public about the workings of the navy and at the same time explain the advantages to be gained by young men joining the naval branch of the government service the navy department opened today an elaborate recruiting station in connection with the naval exhibit at the Preparedness and Prosperity exposition at the Sea Beach palace, Coney Island.

Commander R. K. Crank, in charge of all the navy recruiting stations east of the Rocky Mountains, is in command. While the exhibits include models of battleships, ordnance and projectiles, there is also a duplicate of the gallery of the U. S. S. Connecticut. This portion demonstrates how the meals of the sailors and marines are prepared. There also will be lectures on preparedness by government officials. The entire exhibit was packed for shipment at San Francisco on board one of the government colliers.
