

LAND GRANT BILL PASSES THE SENATE

SKIRMISHING ON IN CHICAGO AND NATION WATCHES

BULL MOOSERS ARE STILL BEING WATCHED

Perkins Says Progressives Are Still Ready to Support Candidate With Progressive Principles—Republican Committee Is Settling Contests Among the Southern Delegations Today

United Press Service CHICAGO, June 1.—George W. Perkins today announced that the progressive party still intends to support any candidate advocating progressive principles.

"The conventions should be for America first, and party afterwards," said he. "Carranza's latest note accuses the administration of misleading the Mexican government. This is the first time a foreign power has ever dared to accuse Uncle Sam of treachery, and our prime object should be to stop this sort of thing and restore our good name."

Chairman Hillis of the republican national committee said he believes the progressives and republicans will unite. He denies the report that the committee, at a meeting today, planned to name a compromise candidate.

Hotel lobby talk today indicated the formation of a combine against Hughes by anti-Hughes republicans and Roosevelt republicans. Roosevelt's secretary said today that Roosevelt is "most surely" a candidate.

The republican committee is hearing forty contests affecting sixty-two Southern delegates. Hillis says these are mainly technical fights for state control.

The committee late this afternoon seated six Alabama "illy-whites" as delegates at large, following an hour's argument by the "black and tan" contestant delegation. The contesting negro delegates in the Ninth Alabama district were seated over Chas. J. Allison and J. G. Bash, both white men.

United Press Service PITTSBURG, June 1.—Colonel Roosevelt today reiterated his intention of remaining away from both of the Chicago conventions.

"I will not go to Chicago," said he, "and that's all I have to say on the subject."

SENATE TODAY CONFIRMS THE NOMINATION OF BOSTON ATTORNEY AS AN ASSOCIATE SUPREME JUSTICE

United Press Service NEW YORK, June 1.—Justice Shearn today sentenced Dr. Warren Waite to electrocution at Sing Sing during the week beginning July 10. Waite was sent to the penitentiary.

The convicted poisoner thanked the court for a speedy trial, stating that he was willing to give his life as partial payment for wrongs he had done others, and that his soul would go on trying to make reparation.

For the second time since the establishment of the Blackburn hospital, a Caesarean operation has been successfully performed there. Drs. Truax and Hunt performed such an operation upon Mrs. T. A. Blake of Turner's Mill, and the mother and her son are both recovering nicely.

The Caesarean operation consists of delivering the unborn babe through the abdominal incision, instead of the usual manner. In the majority of cases, either the mother or the child fails to survive. The name Caesarean comes from a legend by Pliny to the effect that Julius Caesar was brought into the world in this manner.

OFFICIALS SAY MEXICO REQUEST TO BE REJECTED

SHORT AND UGLY TERM FOR CARRANZA

Administration Takes the Stand that Provisional President is Making Misstatements Regarding the Outcome of the Conference Between Scott and Obregon—Perching and Gavira Confer

United Press Service WASHINGTON, D. C., June 1.—The administration plans to issue within a fortnight a statement rejecting Carranza's newest request for a withdrawal of American troops and calling attention to Carranza's misstatements regarding the Mexican situation.

In this way an attempt will be made to eliminate Carranza's misrepresentations, and show him that Americans do not manage Mexico.

General Scott declares that Carranza has wrongly interpreted the Scott-Obregon conference agreement. He denied an agreement covering a withdrawal or even a promise not to pursue the border raiders.

The American reply may insinuate that Carranza is not co-operating with the United States.

General Funston today sent official word that the Scott-Obregon conferences reached no agreement. This is designed to counteract any Mexican claims that the agreement included the withdrawal of American forces from Mexico.

United Press Service DUBLIN, June 1.—Generals Pershing and Gavira today opened a conference in the latter's private car, which was sidetracked in the neutral strip between the American and Carranzista camps.

War Bulletins

United Press Service PARIS, June 1.—The official announcement says the German attack on the eastern slope of Dead Man's Hill was repulsed.

French aviators dropped twenty bombs on Thionville and Auden stations and fifty shells on the German supply depots at Anasnes.

United Press Service BERLIN, June 1.—It is announced that the French captured 400 yards of German trenches southeast of Dead Man's Hill.

German patrols in Alsace penetrated French positions to a depth of 300 yards.

Coast Shipping Tied by Longshoremen's Strike

United Press Service SAN FRANCISCO, June 1.—Ten thousand longshoremen struck today, paralyzing shipping along the entire Pacific coast. The marine engineers may also join in the walkout.

The Sacramento river steamers are all idle. As a result, San Francisco faces a vegetable shortage.

There are 200 vessels idle in Coast ports. Pickets have been placed at all docks. Rumors that strikebreakers

were to be brought in made the situation more tense.

It is reported that the department of justice may send an arbitrator out to attempt mediation.

The Hind-Rolph Navigation has surrendered to the claims of the workmen. Other steamship company representatives met today and considered the demands.

The shipping men expect an amicable settlement. No violence is looked for.
