CHOOSING PUBLIC SERVANTS

PUBLIC officials, preachers and teachers occupy strategic positions in the community organization. All are leaders, or at any rate, should be leaders of thought and action; and they should stand for what is best for the community. Unfortunately the latter two hold their positions temporarily only, and it too often happens that the public officials of a community are selected without much consideration for their attitude toward or their aptitude for community building.

The greatest success in all public callings has come to those persons who had visions that comprehended much larger fields than those in which they sought a livelihood; the public official who merely goes through the routine of his office hardly deserves the name of statesman, the minister whose service to his congregation and to his community does not take him beyond his church walls and the teacher whose conception of his profession is narrowed to the programs of the classroom are not of the sort to fulfill their whole duties to their communities.

Recognition in a public way should be accorded only to those persons who show a disposition to take the broader view of community affairs and whose confidence in its resources and destiny is such as to make their every public act a step toward greater accomplishments. The sober, let-well-enough-alone citizen smiles in derision at the enthusiast, and it always has been the fate of those who looked far into the future to be called visionaries. Yet in every community the public money is being wasted because those whose duty it was to look ahead could not or would not do so. Communities are without parks, or playgrounds; their schools are inadequate to their needs; their public utilities are antiquated, and, in short, they are less enterprising in the conduct of public business than are their citizens in the conduct of their private affairs.

All this is due to the one fact that in the choice of public officials little consideration is given to private efficiency, private enterprise or private success; and the persons chosen need not have manifested any public spirit at all; they are elected because they are "good fellows" and can command the votes that are required to elect them without raising the question of fitness, which would involve a real campaign of education. In other words, it is easier to elect the popular man than to elect the capable man; therefore the popular man, with nothing to recommend him but his popularity, is selected to direct the affairs of an institution requiring ability far in excess of that required in the management of any private business or profession. This same program is repeated year after year, and citizens wonder why their communities do not go ahead.

THE implacable Wilson is now trying to make Champ Clark accept the permanent chairmanship of the St. Louis convention, where his chief function will be to make a speech in glorification of the administration and its record. Inasmuch as Champ Clark's most conspicuous act since 1912 was to take the floor and make a speech in opposition to Wilson's repudiation of the canal tolls plank of the Baltimore platform, it looks as though he now had the chance of his life to show that he can reverse his opinions as readily as Wilson.

He Would Rather Eat Hardware than Groceries

LONDON, June 2.—Holland's human ostrich is dead.

The "Lancet," leading British journal of medicine, is an exhaustive technical treatise on "pics," or human craving for unnatural articles of diet, announced today that a Dutch wharf laborer recovered after attempting to digest three pounds and eleven ounces of hardware.

Discharged from the hospital, the patient left behind a five-inch coal chisel weighing eleven ounces and a large assortment of coins, bolts, nuts, rivets,

wire nails, tin tacks, screws and hooks and a number of small flints he had swallowed.

Six months he returned, suffering weakness and loss of appetite, symptom which he evidenced on the first visit.

This time a piece of tin plate and a portion of slate pencil were removed from the patient and he immediately succeeded in swallowing a piece of soap and two ounces of camphorated spirits. Again he recovered and was removed to an insane asylum where he succumbed to fever and inflammation of the right lung.

Democrats Make Final Plans for Convention

ST. LOUIS, Mo., June 2.—Final plans for the democratic national convention, opening June 14, were approved by the National Committee's committee on arrangements today.

National Chairman McCombs presided at the session. The entire seating plan, arrangements for light and ventilation, decorations, badges, and conveniences for delegates were gone over in detail.

Ten days from now the national committee meeting here will place its final approval of the convention arrangements.

The arrangements committee has determined to keep spectators off the main floor of the convention hall.

Seven thousand five hundred seats have been provided for spectators, the 3,500 places on the floor and platform being reserved for delegates, the press, and officials of the convention. This will be the first convention at which spectators have been barred from the main floor.

The interior of the coliseum has been repainted white, so that greater light will be reflected in the vast hall. An emergency hospital has been equipped and a special system of artificial ventilation installed.

RIGID ECONOMY NOW IN FAMILY OF KING GEORGE

LONDON, May 20.—(By mail)—War economy is being rigidly practiced in the royal household at Windsor Castle.

To save petrol, the royal motor cars are now seldom used. The queen usually rides behind her team of gray horses, while Princess Mary travels horseback.

No alcohol is used in the castle, either by the king's family or his servants. Cider-cup is the strongest drink served; lemonade, or orangeade and barley water are the customary drinks.

The king also has given up plovers' eggs, one of his most favorite dishes, and eats pheasants' eggs instead. As shooting has been abandoned both at Windsor and Sandringham, the eating of pheasants' eggs saves the food needed to rear young birds, and also lessens the damage to wheat fields from the game. Many pheasants' eggs are sent daily to the army hospitals from the royal preserves.
