Why We Are Opposing A
Government Armor Plant

To the People:

Some people say that the very fact that the Bethlehem Steel Company is so aggressively fighting the proposal to build a Government armor plant is conclusive proof that the Company is seeking to assure for itself the "vast profits" derived from private manufacture.

The fact is that armor making is the least profitable feature of steel manufacture.

The reason we oppose a Government plant is very simple. It is this:

Even though there is but little profit in the making of armor, we have invested over \$7,000,000 in our armor plant:

That plant is useless for any other purpose; if a Government plant is built the usefulness of our plant is destroyed.

It would be good business for us to make armor for the Government at any price over and above the actual shop cost, RATHER THAN SACRIFICE OUR ENTIRE INVESTMENT.

We do not seek to save big profits; our purpose is very frankly to save our armor plant—itsself built solely for the use of the Government—from going to the scrap heap.

To do that, we are prepared to agree for any period to any terms of manufacture which the Federal Trade Commission shall say absolutely protects the Government of the United States.

Prineville Endorses the
Opening of Reservation

That the movement for the opening of the Klamath Indian reservation is regarded as a move for progress in Central Oregon and is therefore being supported by interested communities, is evidenced by the following resolution passed by the Prineville Commercial Club:

Whereas, The opening of the Klamath Indian reservation to settlement and development would increase the taxable wealth of Klamath county and the state of Oregon, and would make available for useful development an extensive section of Oregon which under existing conditions is not adding any wealth to the state, but is in fact preventing the proper development thereof;

Whereas, The greater part of Klamath county, Oregon, is now withheld

from various development by reason of the numerous and extensive government reservations within its borders; Whereas, The condition of the Indians will be improved and their interests conserved by the sale of a large portion of the lands now within said Indian reservation; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the Commercial Club of the city of Prineville, Oregon, That we earnestly support the effort of the citizens of Klamath county and of the Commercial Club of Klamath Falls to obtain the opening and sale of the lands within the Klamath Indian reservation, and that we hereby urge our representatives in congress to secure the passage of such legislation as will assure the prompt opening of said reservation to settlement and development.
