MR. HUGHES SPEAKS

MR. CHARLES E. HUGHES has spoken and there was no uncertainty either in his action or speech. Although he has been severely criticized by his political opponents and the democratic press for keeping silent, yet he fully measured up to the expectations of his friends and admirers, when the time came for him to speak.

There was no side stepping or quibbling in his statement. He came out emphatic and flat footed and there can be no misunderstanding just where he stands. While his statement was necessarily brief, he covered the vital questions of the day, and judged from his definite position on these questions the people can feel assured that there will be no vacillating course pursued on other important questions as they come up.

"I stand for the firm and unflinching maintenance of all the rights of American citizens on land and sea," said Mr. Hughes. "I stand for an Americanism that knows no ulterior purpose, for a patriotism that is single and complete. Whether native or naturalized, of whatever race or creed, we have but one country and we do not for an instant tolerate any division of allegiance. I believe in making prompt provision to secure absolutely our national security. I believe in preparedness, not only entirely adequate for our defense with respect to members and equipment in both army and navy, but with all thoroughness to the end that in each branch of the service there may be the utmost efficiency under the most competent administrative heads. We must have the strength which self respect demands, the strength of an efficient nation ready for every emergency."

We believe this is a platform that will win the approval of the American people today. We need a president who can restore the lost prestige of the American nation, a man who is strong and big enough to take advantage of the present opportunities to place the United States as a leader among the nations.

THE PROGRESSIVE PARTY

UNDOUBTEDLY the progressive party has been a benefit to American politics. It has unseated boss rule in the republican party and placed control in the hands of the people, but the progressive party has served its purpose, and its existence is now only a matter of a short time.

FOREST ROAD LAW FAVORED BY NICK

HAWLEY AND SINNOTT BOTH EN-

C., June 12.—Representatives Sinnett and Hawley have presented arguments before the house committee on agriculture in favor of the Taylor forest roads bill, under which the government would advance \$1,000,000 a year for ten years from timber sale receipts in the national forests for the construction of roads through the national forests.

The hearings have been concluded, and Western members generally are urging action. The Taylor bill is a sort of reserve measure. It will not be necessary to pass it if the conference on the Sinnett bill good roads bill agree to the Walsh amendment to that measure, under which a similar plan of forest road building is provided for.

No, They Don't Make 'Em Fast Enough for Klamath

It isn't a case of Klamath Falls picking out weak teams as opponents; it's a case of Klamath Falls having a baseball team that is far and away ahead of anything on the Coast, outside of professional baseball. This fact was brought forcibly home to the fans yesterday at Modoc Park when the Orland team, champions of the Glenn-Butte county section, went down, 8 to 1.

In the hope of getting in what was supposed to be the strongest independent team in California, the local management brought Orland here, a distance of over 300 miles, at big expense. In doing so, it proved to the local fans that an earnest effort is being made to get the best teams possible to play here—even if Klamath Falls should lose—the loyal fans will be given the class of baseball they deserve.

Orland didn't look up according to expectations. The visitors were simply outclassed. There were only three errors charged up, so the fielding wasn't so terribly rotten. It's simply a case of a Klamath Falls team of wonderful strength in every department; a collection of nine ball-playing youths who need take their caps off to none on the Coast when it comes to playing baseball.

Strong as Klamath Falls' team was last year, it was by no means the formidable aggregation that is wallowing 'em all this season. It's too bad that the other teams can't rate up to the material to at least give us a run for the game, but at the same time, they're making baseball history here for the astonishment of the whole Coast.

Modford has a much stronger team than last year, and will play here Sunday. It is hoped that this Modford report is the pure quill dope, for even with a team just a few shades better than last year, they stand in danger of getting just such a wallowing as did Orland.

It is with a view to giving the fans the hottest baseball possible that Klamath Falls is brushing into the leagues for games. So far, the Trolley League has been swiftest to allow games here, and an effort is being made to have a Northern league here for a couple of games.

Duke & Henson's All Stars of the Sacramento Trolley League will play three games here, July 2, 3 and 4. This series should be a real hammer, and will keep many of the fans here who had already planned to spend the Fourth in other cities.

On July 5 Klamath Falls will tackle another tough proposition, the undefeated, hard hitting Willows Glenn. This game will be played at Derris, and many of the fans will go down to California that day—for the game, of course.

Bill Hurn, who is just back from Portland, talked right up to the officials of the later City League, and now a move is under way to have the league wind up a week earlier than scheduled to allow the winning team an opportunity to play Klamath Falls here Labor Day and the Sunday preceding it. Hurn says the later City teams play no better baseball than does Klamath Falls, but the chance of coming here is making better playing in the league than a dozen pennants could.

The Wood team should be better than usual this year, so Saturday, two University of Oregon boys were signed up for the season. Bill Turek, of the Varsity pitching staff, will deliver slants and shoots for the Wood team, and although Bill will never capture the world's strikeout record, he has a real head on his shoulders, and is capable of using this to splendid advantage in a pinch—which is some little help itself. Sheehy, whose out-fielding and hitting are both above the average collegian's playing, will add much strength to the Wood team. Sheehy came very near being a member of the Klamath Falls team, but he signed with Wood before it was known here that Cornell gave it to make to accept a fine permanent position, and therefore cannot spend the summer here.

OLCOTT CARRIED EVERY OREGON COUNTY BUT POLK

SALEM, Ore., June 12.—According to the official returns, Secretary of State Olcott was re-elected in the recent primaries over Charles E. Moore by a majority of 12,300, and Fred G. Buchtel was nominated for public service commissioner in the Western district over Commissioner Campbell by a majority of 15,100.

Secretary Olcott's total vote was 60,897, and Mr. Moore's vote was 48,597. Olcott carried every county save Polk. Buchtel's total vote was 47,130, and Campbell's 32,000. Buchtel carried eleven of the eighteen counties in his district.

SWITZERLAND GETS "MERCHANT MARINE"

NEW YORK, June 12.—Switzerland has at last realized her ambition of being a nation with a merchant marine. She has chartered a steamer to carry supplies from America and Switzerland.

From the port of New York Saturday sailed the steamer Allagunah, flying the flag of the republic of Switzerland from the forepeak. The Allagunah, a freight vessel of 4,000 gross tons, carried a cargo of grain and foodstuffs to the Mediterranean port of Cetta. Cetta, a port in the gulf of Lyons, was loaned by the French government to Switzerland soon after the war closed up many of the ports through which the little republic had been accustomed to receive its supplies.

The Allagunah is the first vessel to be given American clearance papers for a port under the jurisdiction of the Swiss republic.
