New Definitions Given the Military Verbiage

LONDON, June 2.—(By mail)—A brand new "Encyclopedia of Military Terms," published in the "Listening Post," the official organ of the First Canadian division in France, has just reached London, as follows:

"Barbedwire—Invented by Mephisto. It is surprising that he should invent anything of such an affectionate and 'cling' nature. It is used for giving an artistic touch to a trench. No trench is complete without it. It is planted at night so the artillery can plow it up in the morning. A small crop has been known to prevent armies from arguing the point."

"Billet—A billet is anything from a shed to a chateau. A billeting party, sent ahead, is instructed to locate the most draughty and leaky barns in the country. At this they are experts. The generous hearted farmers then inform their cattle and pigs that they must be very polite, and wipe their feet before walking over a brave soldier's blanket."

"Bugle—Except in a band this instrument of torture is seldom used. There are only three popular bugle calls: 'No parade today,' 'Come to the cook house door, boys,' and 'Letters from Sister Susie.' The bugler who

sounds 'reveille' at 5:30 on a frosty morning has no friends, though he is often presented with anything nearest to hand."

"Bayonet—This is the business end of a rifle; it has many uses both in and out of the trenches. A few inches of it pushed through the clothing of an enemy will convince him that he is not 'uber alles.'"

"Bombs—These are good things to keep away from. That is if the other fellow has them. For cleaning up a 'bivvy' full of enemies, a bomb is better than a bayonet."

"Biscuit—The military biscuit 'take the biscuit.' On active service, biscuits are used by the troops to sharpen their teeth on, to write home on, or (when pulverized) to make puddings of. After the war they will be used for making roads, feeding crocodiles, or shooting at mad elephants."

"Bully (or corned beef)—The government issues this when it wishes to convince a hungry soldier that he is not hungry. It is served under many disguises. It may be boiled, baked, stewed, fried or scrambled. A candidate for a cook's job must pass the bully beef test. When he can make bully beef taste like an omelette he is called a 'chef.' If he fails he is called something else."

"Birdie, Come and Enroll Yourself"; Census Starts

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 15.—When Mr. Robin Red Breast and Mr. Robert Thrush swing on the branches near their homes, enjoying the spring breeze and singing and bragging this month, census enumerators from the United States Bureau of Biological Survey will count them.

A really accurate count of a bird population can be made by one bird-lover going over a sixty or eighty acre tract, says the bureau.

The females, busy with spring housework are often missed; but it is a scientific fact that the males are so swagger and conspicuous that it is hard for a counter to miss them.

So the method to be employed in this census—the survey's third—is to count the males of each species, and then multiply by two to get the total.

The survey is calling for volunteer hunters. Especially it wants data on the fruit districts of the Pacific Coast and the South Atlantic and Gulf states. Reports are wanted, too, on moun-

tain, prairie and semi-arid regions. It does not ask expert knowledge.

If bird lovers will take a walk over the fields just as the sun is getting up, they will find every bird worth counting in any sort of census sing-ing, the bureau further advises.

This is a prelude to an extensive campaign to persuade the country that when a bird is killed, the nation loses an asset.

Grain Sorghums Have a Feeding Value Like Corn

The grain sorghums are to the West what corn is to the corn belt, says a new publication of the Department of Agriculture, Farmers' Bulletin No. 784. They are heavy yielders, and the most profitable disposal of the large crop is a vital problem for farmers in many sections of the United States.

A few of the growers of these grains may be able to sell them directly at a profit. For the great majority, however, feeding live stock is practically the only way in which they can secure a market.

Those who fully appreciate the feeding value of these crops, says the bulletin already mentioned, will not hesitate to convert them into beef, pork, mutton, milk or poultry. It is true that the grain sorghums have a somewhat smaller feeding value than corn, but this fact is more than offset by the heavy yields of the former in semi-arid sections, where corn fails.

The grain or nonstarch sorghums which are grown most extensively in this country are kafir, milo, feterita, knolling, shaliu and dura. They may be fed green, both the cured plants and the seed or grain may be fed, or they may be cut for silage.

The composition of these sorghums is very similar to that of corn. In general, therefore, they should be fed in much the same way. Alone, they do not form a balanced ration, and some feed which is rich in protein must be given also, if profitable results are to follow. Cottonseed meal or cake and linseed meal have been most widely used to supply the needed protein. Soybean meal, peanut meal, brewers' grains, etc., are also frequently fed in connection with sorghums. Where alfalfa, clover or other leguminous hay can be had, however, the addition of concentrates rich in protein is not necessary.

For forage and silage the grain sorghums compare quite favorably with corn. Well cured plants with the heads removed and fodder from kafir, milo, etc., are well liked by livestock.
