Marconi Sees Aeroplanes Used for All Purposes

LONDON, June 1.—(By mail)—In future, when giant aeroplanes are making non-stop mail and passenger runs between New York and Chicago, and between other American cities, air passengers will be kept in minutest touch with the day's news by wireless; and officers of the aircraft will receive their orders that way, too.

This dream is legitimized today by Signor Marconi, the youthful father of the wireless, here from Italy.

Through a series of experiments carried out in Italy, Marconi announced that the problem of transmitting wireless messages to aeroplanes has been solved. Hitherto this has been impossible. Explaining the invention, Marconi said: "Before now aeroplanes have been at a disadvantage with airships in wireless work because while they were able to transmit messages, they have not been able to receive them."

"This was because the receiving signal was too faint to be distinguished over the noise of the motor. 'We have been able to strengthen the receiving signal sufficiently to enable messages to be taken.'"

Great commercial opportunities are open to the wireless after the war, Marconi also announced. Long distance transmission has been signally improved. The wireless telephone already is playing its part in the war. Marconi is a soldier, and therefore cannot give details of his new discovery.

Pursuant to direction of the common council of the city of Klamath Falls, notice is hereby given that the undersigned, Police Judge of said city, will receive proposals at his office in said city up to and including Monday evening at 8 o'clock p. m., of June 26th, 1918, for making the proposed improvement of the "Shippington Roadway" on and over the following described route, to-wit:

Oregon avenue from Delta street to Nevada avenue; Nevada avenue to California avenue; California avenue to Front street; Front street to Frederick street, and Frederick street through block 3, of Shippington Addition to center line of Bismark street, a total distance of 9,887 feet; also First street from Oregon Avenue to city limits.

The proposed improvement includes the grading of said route and hard-surfacing of the same to a width of sixteen feet with either bituminous or oil macadam pavement. All of said proposed improvement to be made and the materials furnished and to be used thereon to be in accordance with the plans and specifications of the city engineer, on file in the office of said Police Judge, reference thereto is hereby made for further details as to plans, method of construction, materials and quantities.

The making of said proposed improvement will be let in one contract to the lowest responsible bidder, bidding on type of construction selected by the Common Council. All proposals received will be opened for consideration by the Common Council at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. of the 26th day of June, A. D. 1918, at the council chamber in said city. Bidders will be required to submit proposals on blanks prepared and furnished by the city engineer; and bids not submitted on such blanks will not be considered. Blanks may be obtained at the office of Mr. Don J. Zumwalt, city engineer. The successful bidder will be required to enter into contract and furnish a bond satisfactory to the Common Council in a sum not exceeding the contract price within ten days after the award. Each proposal must be accompanied by a check certified by some responsible bank for 5 per cent of the amount of bid as a guarantee of good faith, to be forfeited to the city in the event of failure of the successful bidder to enter into contract and give the required bond within ten days after the award.

The Common Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids, and to proceed to make such proposed improvement itself.

Who'll Lose Most Money on War Bothers English

LONDON, June 15.—Somebody is going to lose financially by the war, of course, but authorities are not agreed as to whether it will be everybody or not. The answer most generally given is the affirmative—that all classes will suffer. Certain optimists, however, think perhaps—they are not certain—that the masses will be better off after, than before, the war. Their hope is that those who have hitherto been society's parasites will have to foot the bills.

These theorists argue: "The parasites' money did the masses no good when the parasites had it; it can do the masses no harm to have it taken away from the parasites."

"It is further argued that such a situation would imply an economic readjustment which must make for better conditions except for those who have lived in the past on production

by the actual workers. The view is not held by socialists alone. A number of men who belong to the class which must do the financial sweating should the forecasts be borne out by events, think the same thing or, rather, are afraid the prediction is an accurate one. It looks, as they express it, as if "the aristocracy will have to go to work."

H. G. Selfridge, the American department store proprietor, for several years now in business in London, for example, in effect expressed this opinion in a recent exclusive interview to the United Press.

Selfridge, however, as a man himself actively in business, spoke of the possible development as a thing to be desired.

A good many others who agree with him want no such change, because it will be at their expense, but nevertheless they believe the signs indicate that it cannot be avoided.

MONTANA OFFICIALS' TRUST PROBED BY UNCLE SAM

Two officers of the company, Robert R. Sidebotham and J. G. G. Short, already have been arrested and charged with fraudulent use of the mails in transacting the company's business. The president of the company is A.

M. Alderman, Montana's secretary of state; the secretary-treasurer is William C. Roe, Montana's state treasurer, and ex-Governor Edwin L. Harris of Montana is its attorney.
