SOME SEA FIGHTS

WHEN men refer to the battle in
the North Sea as the greatest
naval battle in history they make a
mistake. They may say it was the
most costly in history, keeping in mind
what the value was of the ships that
went down, but at Salamis, the first
naval battle of which the record is
authentic, more men died than there
were on board all the ships in the
North Sea fight. It was the same way
at Lepanto; it was vastly more so
when the great Armada was shattered;
it was the same way at the battle of
the Nile and very many more in the
more than three thousand years since
nations began to try final conclusions
on the sea.

Salamis was fought 481 years before
the coming of the Savior, and an eye-
witness said of it that at one time
during the battle "the waters of the
bay could not be seen, so covered were
they with wreckage and dead and
dying men." In that battle 1,200 gal-
leys were engaged, and more than 400
were destroyed. The invasion of
Greece by Xerxes was turned back by
the fight. It was on the sea what the
Marathon was on land.

Actium was fought on an arm of the
Adriatic. There Octavius Caesar and
Antony tried final conclusions, and
Antony "lost the world." The dead
numbered far more than in the North
Sea battle.

Lepanto in the fight in an inlet of
the Adriatic October 7, 1571, not only
broke the arm of Turkey and saved
Southern Europe, but so broke the
heart of the Turk that she has made
no aggressive war since.

The fleets of Spain, Venice and the
 pope, under command of Don Juan of
Austria, fought the Turks on that day,
but there were a dozen great captains
in each fleet.

The great Armada was a mighty
fleet fitted out by Spain and France to
crush the power of "Old Queen Bess"
of England. It was a veritable cloud
of ships, vastly more numerous, and
of much greater size than those of
England, but Howard, Drake and Sey-
mour fought them for five days, sink-
ing a vast number of them; then a
hurricane destroyed nearly all the
rest. A mere remnant reached home.

The battle of the Nile, in 1798, raged
from dusk nearly all night, and was
won against heavy odds by the genius
of Lord Nelson. When Napoleon heard
of it, he paid a wonderful tribute to
Lord Nelson, but finished the eulogy
by sentimentally remarking: "I can't
be everywhere at once." Great pair,
those two! When Napoleon had his
heel on the neck of every power of
continental Europe, Nelson had every
port blockaded against the French.

At Trafalgar, fought off the south-
west coast of Portugal, August 21,
1805, Nelson destroyed what sea
power Spain and France had pos-
sessed, killing 10,000 Spaniards alone,
and stopped Napoleon's meditated in-
vasion of England, but Lord Nelson
was fatally wounded by a sharp shoot-
er in the rigging of a Spanish ship, and
died just as the final shots of his vic-
torious fleet were being fired. Then a
hurricane came which some of the
captains of the English fleet declared
was the most terrific they had ever
seen at sea.

IF WE MUST tell why we occasion-

Re-Mapping Europe Will
Be Some Strenuous Task

port. It is not much of a secret that
England is not very happy over this
prospect. The British would rather
see Constantinople internationalized—
a neutral city. It will be hard, how-
ever, to deny to their allies the one
thing they are most particularly an-
xious to secure. The issue may conceiv-
ably become the subject of discord be-
tween the two big powers. This, how-
ever, only disposes of Europe. Russia
will get a big chunk of Turkey's Asi-
atic territory, perhaps as far south as
Ispahan. The czar will dominate
Northern Persia, also, if he does not
actually annex it.

England will hold a similar position
in Southern Persia, and will get Mes-
opotamia and the sultan's possessions
south from Baghdad to the Persian
Gulf. Greece, if she is good, will get
Smyrna and a little territory surround-
ing the city.

In Africa the Cameroons will go to
France. Belgium will get part of Ger-
man East Africa. England will take
the rest of the Kaiser's African posses-
sions. Germany's islands will be kept
by the powers which have taken them,
Japan, England, Australia and New
Zealand. Japan will retain Kiao Chau.

Some allied diplomats hold that war
should continue until Germany and
Austria are broken up into their origi-
nal states. Others see no objection to
a continued federation, into which
they predict Austria will be drawn.

What will be the outcome, nobody
knows. All this is taking it for grant-
ed the allies will be victorious.
If the central powers should win, it
is accepted as a foregone conclusion
that Germany will keep Belgium, per-
haps take enough of Holland to give
the Kaiser control of the Scheldt, gather
in enough of northern France to se-
cure Calais, regain all lost German col-
onies, annex Courland from Russia,
wrest Singapore from England as the
gateway to the Orient, seize Indo-
China from the French and establish
Poland as a nominally self-governing
kingdom under German domination.

It is taken for granted further, that
old Serbia and Montenegro will be-
come Austrian, that Bulgaria will get
Macedonia and a big mouthful of the
territory Greece took from Turkey,
that Germany will become paramount
in Rumania, Albania and Persia, and
that, through his over-lordship of Aus-
tria, Bulgaria and Turkey, the Kaiser's
rule will extend, in effect, as far as
the Persian Gulf.

From Italy Austria is expected to
get the province of Venice.
Earlier in the war there was much
talk of big money indemnities to be
paid by the losing to the winning side.
There isn't much of this talk now, for
each side is convinced that it can't
get what the other won't have for a
long time after peace is restored.

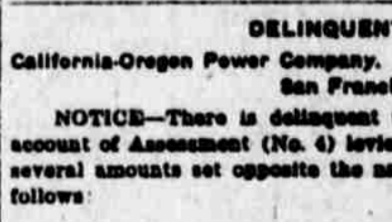
