A GET TOGETHER CLUB FOR OREGON

THE OPPORTUNITY to vote for Hughes next fall should at the same time furnish Oregon republicans another opportunity they should embrace.

It is this—to bring Oregon finally and definitely back into the republican fold. Oregon has somewhat of a reputation for being queer in a political way; to a certain extent it deserves that reputation. With an overwhelming republican majority we send two democratic senators back to Washington to represent us. Is there any sane and logical reason for doing it? Have we been better represented, has the state gained more in power and prestige, because we have sent democrats instead of republicans there? Oregon even went so far four years ago as to send a democratic senator who gave a democratic administration the control of that body.

So far as Hughes is concerned, there is no question of his carrying Oregon; the only question involved is how big that majority may be. Oregon was in the van as a hotbed of Hughes sentiment long before the convention. The republicans here know precisely whom they wanted. It is not too much to say that the action of the republicans of this state under the peculiar circumstances that surrounded the Hughes movement, gave that touch of enthusiasm and assurance which it lacked at a critical moment. This being true, it is up to Oregon to roll up a majority for Hughes such as it never in its history has given to any other man. Oregon owes it to itself to do it. It can be done by a little personal work on the part of each individual republican, a little work that in each case will mean the getting of one, two or three votes. It will likewise mean the return to political sanity, to a full republican delegation in congress composed of men in whom the public has confidence and who will be retained there so long as they render good and faithful service.

Mayo Today Takes Over Atlantic Fleet Command

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 18.—When Vice Admiral H. T. Mayo succeeds Admiral Frank F. Fletcher in command of the Atlantic fleet today, he will be advanced to the rank of admiral.

Rear Admiral De Witt Coffman, commanding the sixth division of the fleet, will be advanced to the grade of vice admiral, succeeding Admiral Mayo.

Admiral Fletcher will automatically become a rear admiral. He will receive an important shore detail.

Secretary of the Navy Daniels announced these changes after a conference with President Wilson. The secretary also conferred personally this week with Admirals Fletcher and Mayo.

"When relieved of the command today," said Secretary Daniels, "Admiral Fletcher will have served a little longer than fleet commanders usually serve. He is a splendid officer and has accomplished much with the fleet. He has completed his tour of duty as commanding officer of the fleet, and there is no other reason for the change."

"Admiral Mayo is an officer of great ability, and has rendered splendid service," said Mr. Daniels. "He has the confidence of the officers and men in the entire fleet."

Admiral Mayo is the man who precipitated the trouble with Huerta which resulted in the occupation of Vera Cruz by American forces. The admiral insisted that Huerta salute the American flag because of the arrest of American marines at Tampico when they went ashore to get mail. Later marines were landed at Vera Cruz, and Admiral Fletcher was in command of that movement.

In service circles unanimous praise was given today to Mr. Daniels' selection of vice admiral Mayo for the most coveted of posts. There is a particular feeling of satisfaction at the appointment because of the fear that Vice Admiral Mayo's part in the Tampico affair during the critical days of the struggle with Huerta had placed the officer's star under a cloud.

But Admiral Fletcher proved a strong friend for Vice Admiral Mayo, and when the Atlantic fleet was organized, with Admiral Fletcher in command, Rear Admiral Mayo received command of the battleship squadron and of the first division, with the rank of vice admiral.

Vice Admiral Mayo comes to the fleet command at the age of 58, retiring in December, 1918. His recent duties have been as commandant of the Mare Island navy yard, aid for personnel, and division commander in the Atlantic fleet.

METALLIC LINES BETWEEN KLAMATH AND ASHLAND AND KLAMATH AND DORRIS—MUCH WORK IN THIS CITY

A crew of workmen under Foreman Crawford of the Pacific Telephone & Telephone company are engaged in making improvements to the company's service and service capacity here. They are erecting 200 poles and putting in an additional mile of cable, their work tending to make more permanent leads for future business from Mills addition and Shippington.

In addition, the crew will put in an all-metallic circuit between Klamath Falls and Ashland and between Klamath Falls and Dorris. This will greatly reduce the noise occasioned on the grounded line by the proximity of the high power lines.
