SUIT TO RECOVER SAWMILL OUTFIT

SAM T. SUMMERS BRINGS ACTION FOR RECOVERY AND FOR DAMAGES AGAINST DAIRY SAWMILL OPERATOR

A suit was filed in the circuit court today for the recovery of sawmill fittings valued at \$1,133.94 and \$750 damages. S. T. Summers, the plaintiff, alleging these to be due him from A. E. Chambers, who operates a sawmill

near Dairy. The suit was filed by Attorney J. C. Rutledge.

In his complaint, Summers alleges that Chambers took the equipment from a mill at Chiloquin. In removing the equipment, Summers alleges that Chambers so wrecked the plant that special millwright work and much new woodwork had to be paid for, and he asks \$250 special damages. In addition to asking the possession of the machinery, he asks \$500 general damages as a result of the plant being rendered useless in its present dismantled state.

THINK METEOR IS FROM SON

PECULIARLY COMPOSED METEOR, SHAPED LIKE RIGHT HAND, FALLS ON FARM JUST AFTER THE BOY DIES

LINWOOD, N. J., June 22.—A meteor in the form of a human hand fell from the sky and buried itself in the ground near Henry Pranti's farmhouse within forty-eight hours after the death of his 18-year-old son.

Mrs. Pranti today declined to surrender the meteor to any of the several meteorologists who came here after it, saying she believes it a message from her boy.

Mrs. Pranti is superstitious and has talked a great deal with spiritualists since the meteor dropped from the clouds.

The object is light in weight and color, has no odor and is unlike meteoric compositions usually found in this part of the world. The resemblance to a human right hand is striking, almost uncanny. The thumb and little finger are unusually long. The nails show distinctly. The first, middle and ring fingers are drawn together and curve slightly inward. The wrist stump is charred, as though it had been burned off. The Prantis will encase the hand in glass and keep it.

TITANIC WIDOW MARRIES AGAIN

MRS. JOHN JACOB ASTOR WEDS KARL DIK OF NEW YORK, THEREBY LOSING ASTOR INHERITANCE

NEW HARBOR, Me., June 22.—Mrs. Madeline Furse Astor, widow of the late John Jacob Astor, and one of the Titanic survivors, married William Carl Dik of New York this afternoon. She is vice president of a big trust company, and is part owner of the New York Times.

By her marriage Mrs. Dik loses the income from the \$5,000,000 estate left by her husband, and the Astor name as Fifth Avenue, both of these going to Vincent Astor.
