MEXICAN FUSS IS ASSISTING CAMP

NEWS OF BORDER TROUBLE IS CAUSE OF INCREASED INTEREST IN CITIZENS' TRAINING CAMP AT MONTEREY

SAN FRANCISCO, June 23.—Excitement over the Mexican situation is creating increased interest in the war department's military instruction camp for civilians, that opens at Monterey July 10th for four weeks, and the military authorities are going ahead with enrollments for the camp regardless of what is going on at the border line.

It is not believed that the recent order for the mobilization of the militia will in any way affect the military training camps and the camps will be held as scheduled. The war department has just issued instructions to ship the necessary camp equipment to Monterey for the camp.

Two more companies of coast artillery from Fort Winfield Scott, Calif., are enroute to Monterey by marching, to act as troops of instruction for the civilians. Two companies already are at the camp site, preparing it for the reception of the civilians. Altogether, some 650 regular soldiers, for the most part coast artillery acting as infantry, are expected to participate in the encampment.

This is expected to be a banner week in camp enrollments, as the time for receiving new recruits is becoming short. Captain John E. Murphy, officer in charge of summer camps, Western department, U. S. army, San Francisco, is receiving applications for enrollment and furnishing data regarding the encampment to prospective recruits.

Women's Training Camp a Real Instructive Place

POMPTON LAKE, N. J., June 23.—Thirty young women of New York society started home from here today after three weeks learning the ins and outs of soldiering so that in time of need they may be of help to their country. They were under the command of Miss Candace Hewitt, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edward R. Hewitt, and were instructed by directors supervised by General E. Z. Steever, U. S. A., retired.

The Emergency Service corps is the official title of Captain Hewitt's girls, and in their three weeks' camp they covered a course of intensive instruction, embracing from messenger service to cooking and from peeling potatoes to bareback riding.

Miss Hewitt and her sister, Miss Lucy Hewitt, were the organizers of the camp. They took their idea before a committee of prominent men and women and after careful study the training course was worked out.

The purposes of the corps are to lead girls who have had opportunities in life to recognize their responsibilities.

The course included making camp, cooking, riding, swimming, first aid and

sanitation. Lectures will be given in military law so that the girls may realize fully in what relation they will stand to their own and to enemy troops in time of war.

Miss Hewitt laid down a list of equipment with which each young woman must provide herself. This included two pairs of waterproof shoes, three pairs of thick stockings, one pair of woolen socks, one pair of sneakers, three changes of underclothing, one set of waist garters, one pair of leather puttees, three olive drab shirts, one campaign hat, one pair of service gauntlets, one belt, two red ties, one uniform coat, two pairs of uniform breeches, one slicker, two pairs of pajamas, one sweater coat and one bathing suit. Shirts are taboo.

The girls learned how to wig-wag with the general service code and semaphore code, and the mysteries of lighting beacon fires and making signal smokes—which last is no mean art in itself.

Among the girl rookies were Misses Mildred Sawyer, Rosanna Bowen, Margaret Lindabury, Mildred River, Abby Morrison, Martha S. Gay, Helen Seton, Alice Thorne, Helen W. Green, Agnes Fowler, E. Rita Norris, Elizabeth Mosie and Elizabeth Harrison.

Nebraska Harvests Biggest Wheat Crop

LINCOLN, Neb., June 23.—Nebraska's great annual wheat crop harvest has begun. The largest wheat crop in the state's history is being gathered—such a crop as the state did not even dream of ten years ago.

Between 71,000,000 and 74,000,000 bushels of winter wheat is the estimate of the state's labor bureau, which also estimated that 7,000 extra farm hands were needed for the harvest.

Besides this, some spring wheat is raised in the northern section of the

state, but this amount is relatively small and its harvest will begin in two or three weeks.

The Hessian fly did some damage this year as usual, but the pest was only in certain sections and there only in small spots. Less damage by the Hessian fly was done this year than last.

Hail also did slight damage, some fields being completely devastated, but this loss, too, was relatively small.

The wheat crop of Nebraska this year, it is estimated, will exceed that of last year by about 10,000,000 bushels.

LONDON, June 1.—(By Mail).—The strain of twenty months of war on the composite brain of a nation showed today that common, ordinary bandages is the new insignia of sympathy.

Just like the sight of a shamrock flashes to the brain of an individual that it's St. Patrick's Day, the sight of bandage tells the average Britisher that he should be sympathetic.

To have on your finger a semi-carbuncular furuncle (which is an over-sealious boil) is to wear your arm in a sling. This means a liberal display of bandages.

Walking along a crowded thoroughfare with your arm in a sling transforms you from an able bodied slacker to a hero just back from the front.

A uniform isn't necessary. The sympathetic "composite war brain" overlooks all that is lacking. You have been wounded and it can readily be seen that you are tired of wearing your uniform and you are modest about attracting attention anyhow.

Old ladies beam on you in trams, buses and subways.

You are petted and pampered by conductors, who hold their vehicle while you get safely seated.

Men on the street who wear the Derby armband look sheepish when you pass.

Barbers take special care not to jostle your "wounded" arm. Waitresses and waiters sympathetically carve your meat.

Ushers in theaters follow you to

your seat and take your things back to the cloak room.

Shop clerks tie up your bundles with a special loop of strong cord so you can hook it over your unwounded finger.

Traffic "Bobbies" occasionally salute.

Everybody has your number. You are a wounded soldier, except: When you are an American reporter with a boil on your finger.
