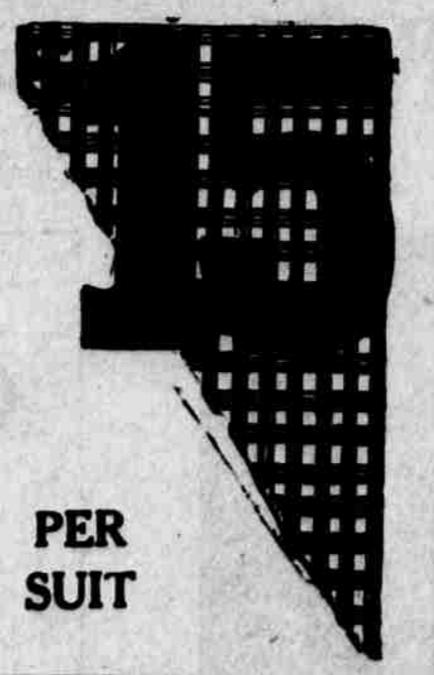

# SAXON "SIX"
