## RABIES SIGNS IN DORRIS DISTRICT

FOLLOWING DISCOVERY OF THE DREAD MALADY IN CALF ON A RANCH NEAR DORRIS, MUZZLING OF DOGS IS ORDERED

Stikyou county, in the vicinity of Dorris, is the latest district to become apprehensive regarding rabies. This follows the discovery on the ranch of J. R. Clemens, two miles west of Dorris, of a calf frothing at the mouth and exhibiting other symptoms of hydrophobia.

The head was sent to the board of health at Berkeley, and showed the presence of rabies. Further investigation developed that the calf was bitten by a coyote.

As a result, Stikyou will soon raise the coyote bounty and require the muzzling or killing of dogs.
