

"Wilson and His Party Are Found Wanting," Says Colonel Roosevelt

THEODORE SAYS HUGHES MEETS ALL THE STANDARDS AS SET FORTH BY THE PROGRESSIVES, AND MUST BE ELECTED TO RESTORE THE NATION TO ITS PLACE AMONG THE WORLD'S POWERS

Following are extracts from the lengthy letter sent by Colonel Roosevelt to the progressive national committee yesterday, declining the progressive nomination as president:

"In my judgment, the nomination of Mr. Hughes meets the conditions set forth in the statement of the progressive national committee, issued last January, and in my own statements. Under existing conditions, the nomination of a third ticket would, in my judgment, be merely a move in the interest of the election of Mr. Wilson. I regard Mr. Hughes as a man whose public record is a guarantee that he will not merely stand for a program of clean-cut, straight-out Americanism, before election, but will resolutely and in good faith, put it through if elected.

"He is beyond all comparison better fitted to be president than Mr. Wilson. It would be a grave detriment to the country to re-elect Mr. Wilson. I shall, therefore, strongly support Mr. Hughes. Such being the case, it is unnecessary to say that I cannot accept the nomination on a third ticket. I do not believe that there should be a third ticket. I believe that when fellow progressives coolly consider the question they will for the most part take this position.

"It is urged against Mr. Hughes that he was supported by the various so-called German-American alliances. I believe that the attitude of these professional German-Americans was due, not in the least to any liking for Mr. Hughes, but solely to their antagonism to me. They were bound to defeat me for the nomination. The only way by which they could achieve this object was by supporting Mr. Hughes and they supported him accordingly, without regard to other conditions.

"I need hardly repeat what I have already said in stern reprobation of this professional German-American element—the element typified by the German-American alliances, and similar bodies, which have throughout the pre-nomination campaign, played not merely an un-American, but a thoroughly anti-American part. These men have nothing in common with the great body of Americans who are in whole or in part of German blood; and who are precisely as good Americans as those of any other country.

"The country is passing through a great crisis and no man can tell what trial and jeopardy will have to be faced by this nation in the years immediately ahead. There is no longer before us the decision as to what particular man we may severally most desire to see at the head of the government. We can decide only whether during these possibly vital years the country shall have been entrusted to the leadership of Mr. Hughes or Mr. Wilson.

"Mr. Wilson has been tried and found wanting. His party, because of its devotion to the outworn theory of state rights and because of its reliance upon purely sectional support, stands against that spirit of far sighted nationalism which is essential if we are to deal adequately with our gravest social and industrial problems. Mr. Wilson and his party have in actual practice lamentably failed to safeguard the interest and honor of the United States. They have brought us to impotence abroad and given us weakness at home.

"They have taught us that peace, the peace of cowardice and dishonor and indifference to the welfare of us all, is to be put above righteousness, above the stern and unflinching performance of duty, whether the duty is

pleasant or unpleasant. Yet in Mexico they have failed even to secure the peace which they thus sought; and they have failed in spite of the most ample opportunity and most ample warning, to prepare in any real fashion to meet the crisis which their own policies invited.

"Events of the last few weeks have shown that much cannot be said for Mr. Wilson. In Mr. Wilson's case, we do not have to consider his words, but his deeds. His deeds absolutely contradict his words; and for the matter of that, his words absolutely contradict one another. It is folly to place any of the promises on which he now stands in view of the fact that almost every important promise contained in the platform on which he stood four years ago has since been broken.

"We owe all our present trouble with the professional German-American element in the United States to Mr. Wilson's timid and vacillating course during the last two years. The defenders of Mr. Wilson have alleged in excuse for him that he confronted a difficult situation. As regards Mexico, the situation which Mr. Wilson confronted was nothing like as difficult as that which President McKinley confronted in connection with Cuba and the Philippines at the time of the Spanish war.

"Mr. Hughes has shown in his career the instinct of efficiency which will guarantee that, under him, the government will once more work with vigor and force. He possesses that habit of straightforward thinking which means that his words will be correlated with his deeds and translated into facts. His past career is the warrant for our belief that he will be the unfaltering opponent of that system of invisible government which finds expression in the domination of the party boss and the party machine. His past career is a guarantee that whatever he says before election will be made good by his acts after election. Morally, his public record shows him to be a man of unbending integrity; intellectually, it shows him to be a man of original and trained ability. We have the alternative of continuing an administration which has proved a lamentable failure or of putting into office an administration which we have every reason to believe will function with efficiency for the interest and honor of all our people. I earnestly bespeak from my fellow progressives their ungrudging support of Mr. Hughes."

Ashland is in Readiness For the Big Celebration

ASHLAND, June 27.—Plans for Ashland's big three-day celebration, July 4th, 5th and 6th, are going steadily forward. All indications point to tremendous crowds and the committee on accommodations is working strenuously to prepare for them.

The Rogue River Round-Up has grown to stupendous proportions. The grounds are larger than those at Pendleton. Grandstands are already erected to seat 10,000 people.

Friendly rivalry between riders of the north and south ends of Eastern Oregon promises to contribute to a whirlwind frontier show. Buffalo Vernon, champion roper and bulldogger of the world, is on the grounds assisting the committee.

The baseball committee has contracts signed for daily games between Medford and Wood. Both teams are in practice and a battle royal is promised.

Music for the celebration will be provided by three of the best bands

in Southern Oregon—those of Ashland, Central Point and probably Grants Pass. Huge posters are on the billboards announcing the magnificent display which the Hitt Fireworks company of Seattle has been engaged to put on.

The three big parades will be of a most gorgeous character. Business houses and various organizations and individuals are planning floats. Many fraternal organizations will enter the parades with uniformed marching clubs. Many decorated automobiles from afar are promised.

Queen Luthia and King Sulphur are now being chosen by ballot. Concessions are being granted for many minor attractions and Ashland's two big Natatoriums are planning water sports and dances to help entertain the crowd.

Camp grounds are being provided for large numbers and visitors who can do so are urged to come prepared to take advantage of these facilities.

WOMAN NON-COM BLOODY FIGHTER

FEMININE CORPORAL IN RUSSIAN RANKS FIGHTS WITH COSSACKS TO AVENGE THE DEATH OF HER FATHER AT THE FRONT

PETROGRAD, June 27.—"South of Mahala, one of our reconnaissance patrols severely punished the enemy, causing him great losses. The leader of the patrol was Corporal Glutchenko Tcherniawka, who though twice wounded, brought the party safely back to our lines."—Official Communiqué.

Corporal Glutchenko Tcherniawka is a woman. She bears an inhuman hatred of the enemy. The Cossack patrol which she commands is noted for its fearlessness and daring—always led by her. She is known by the enemy to be a fine soldier, but wild and brutal and relentless and unpardoning. Her patrol is known as the "Eagles," because these Cossacks swoop down, do their bloody work and disappear.

In this way, the girl Cossack leader is avenging her father, Major Glutchenko, killed at the front several months ago. She arrived at the front in September and has since been recommended six times for decorations. Her soldiers worship her and the enemy has put a price on her head.
