PHONE POLES A CAUSE OF FUSS

TELEPHONE COMPANY SEEKS TO PUT POLES ON WEST SIDE OF CONGER, RESIDENTS OBJECT, SO MEETING IS CALLED

A meeting of Mayor Crisler, City Engineer Zumwalt, the light committee of council, officials of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company and Conger avenue property owners will be held on the aforementioned street at 8 o'clock tomorrow morning, to determine whether the telephone company should be allowed to place poles on the west side of the street.

The company asked permission at last night's meeting of the council, pointing out that the telephone wires are all being removed from the power line poles, for betterment of working conditions and phone service. A representative of some of the property owners objected upon the ground that the street is already too narrow, and the poles will prove a serious obstruction.

Afternoon—Grammar, Geography, Stenography, American Literature, Physics Typewriting, Methods in Language, Thesis for Primary Certificate, Education, Science of.

June 30th
Forenoon—Theory and Practice, Orthography, Physical Geography, English Literature, Chemistry, Education, History of.

Afternoon—School Law, Geology, Algebra, Civil Government, Education, Childhood and Adolescence.

July 1st
Forenoon—Geometry, Botany, Education, School Administration.

Afternoon—General History, Bookkeeping, Education, Method.
