CANNOT TAX THE O.-C. LAND GRANT

ATTORNEY GENERAL GIVES OPINION THAT TITLE TO THESE HOLDINGS IS NOW HELD BY THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

SALEM, July 1.—In an opinion just rendered by Attorney General Brown it is held that the act recently passed by congress, disposing of lands held by the Southern Pacific Railroad company under the Oregon & California land grant, reinvests title to the lands in the federal government, and that they are not now subject to taxation. The opinion was rendered at request of the state tax commission. The lands heretofore have yielded the state an annual tax ranging between \$400,000 and \$500,000.

"The act reinvests the title held by the railroad company in the lands in the federal government, and under the laws of this state, as well as those of the government, federal property is not subject to taxation," said the attorney general, in part. "Under the act but one conclusion can be reached, and that is that the lands are not assessable, for to hold otherwise would be to hold that the act itself is not valid."

The tax commission said the opinion would have no effect on assessments of previous years, and that it was desired only that the commission might know whether or not to put the lands on the assessment roll for next year.

FRANCE ORDERS 10,000 HORSES

OVER A MILLION AND A HALF TO BE PAID BY REPUBLIC FOR STEEDS BEFORE THE MIDDLE OF THIS MONTH

United Press Service LINCOLN, Neb., July 1.—The French government is still buying American horses, having within the last two weeks placed contracts for 10,000 head, the order to be filled by July 15th.

Omaha is the concentration point for this shipment. One hundred and sixty-five dollars per head is the price under the contract, making the total expenditure for this shipment \$1,650,000. Most of this money will go to horse raisers in Nebraska, though some horses will be taken from Kansas, Iowa and South Dakota.

Since the beginning of the war horses have been concentrated in this section for shipment to the allies for use in the war zone.
