THAT "INSIDIOUS LOBBY"

THERE may be a few people, but not many, who will be misled by the assertion of Chairman Ollie M. James, of the democratic national convention, who said:

"President Wilson drive invisible government out of Washington, and uncovered the mightiest lobby that ever ramified a republic or had its rendezvous in its capital. He drove the lobbyist out; he turned the American people in."

Because manufacturers had representatives in Washington to appear before the ways and means committee at the time the democratic tariff bill was being framed, President Wilson staged the "insidious lobby" farce. A select committee on lobby investigation was appointed. After extended investigation of this "mightiest lobby" that ever ramified a republic one lone congressman was found censurable, and he was a democrat—Hon. James T. McDermott of Illinois, who resigned, and was re-elected by his constituents to the 64th congress. Martin A. Mulhall, a citizen, was held up to obloquy by the house committee. The senate committee never reported its findings, because they had nothing to report. The American people that Mr. Wilson "turned in" to the capital were the "deserving democrats" who became office holders in violation of the civil service law.

Speaking of lobbies in connection with the tariff, the lemon lobby which came to light a few months ago might be cited. In this case \$145,000 was paid by importers of Italian lemons to certain lobbyists who appeared before the democratic ways and means committee and argued for a cut in the duty on lemons. Considerable of their argument is said to have been presented in the corridors of the capitol. The Italian vote was delivered to Wilson, and the duty on lemons was slashed to the bone. Whose hands were smeared in that deal?

FIGHT FOR TAX REDUCTION

PERSONS with bills to go before the legislature or by initiative before the people, involving large expenditures, might as well save themselves trouble, as they will not be authorized.

Political cranes and their effect on taxation are being thought over by the people as never before, and not many more steps in that direction will be taken on this coast in the near future.

The high cost of living and the high cost of government are in large part due to the development of a trained army of experts, or political pests, called uplift boards, commissions, or what not.

The average per capita tax in Oregon is nearly as high today as in war-ridden Germany, and from \$20 per capita to \$60 per capita within a decade on progressive lines.

In twenty years Oregon taxation increased 500 per cent, and the per capita in the three coast states is about the same—all higher than New York. The tax rate should come down 25 per cent.

Cheap capital, with high taxation, will not employ high priced labor, and establishment of new industries will go on very slowly until the average rate of taxation has been reduced considerably.

Cheap capital becomes dear capital when taxes amount to two and a half to three per cent. Low rates of interest are impossible for industrial development or manufacturing enterprises.

It is only the interest-eating mortgage that can live when the cost of government is too high, and the high cost of living can not be reduced with taxation applied in too many forms.

Movie Company Pays Its
Employees Who Join Army

WILLIAM FOX

William Fox, president of the Fox Film corporation, known throughout the film industry as "the man who broke the movie trust," and himself one of the largest producers and distributors of motion pictures in the world, employing 10,000 men of fighting age, has notified President Wilson and Secretary of War Baker that he and his corporation have granted full pay to every employee who has or will voluntarily enlist in the military or naval service of the United States during the Mexican crisis.

It taking this action, Mr. Fox has been moved by a spirit of patriotism and fair play. He has notified his employees throughout the United States

that their salaries will be paid to their families each week, from the day they are mustered into service until they are honorably discharged. Their positions in the corporation will be held open for them until they return, no matter how long they may be required in the service of their country.

Many of Mr. Fox's employees have already been mustered into service in the various militia regiments throughout the nation. Many more, who were contemplating joining the regimental colors of state militia, but were prevented by the fear that their families would suffer financially during their absence, have now signified their intention of immediately joining the national guard.

MILLS, STORES
CLOSE FOR 4TH

As a result of the many celebrations in other towns, there is a temporary cessation of business activities here this week. The lumber plants are shutting down, and all the business houses will close tomorrow.

This is a busy day at the grocery stores, the meat markets, clothing stores, court house, city hall, postoffice and banks, as all of these will remain closed all day tomorrow. Therefore, many of the business houses are using extra clerks today to accommodate the rush of business.

The Herald will suspend publication tomorrow in order to allow the employees an opportunity to enjoy the holiday.

The lumber plants are all shutting down for several days, the wood camps are deserted, and the employees are hitting for Ashland, Dorris and other towns for celebrations. The Algoma Lumber company's mill will close tonight, and will not reopen until Thursday.

The Ewauna Box company will close its factory this evening, and resume work on the morning of the 6th.
