Klamath Wins Easily in First Game With "Stars"

It looked even as late as yesterday morning as if there would be no Sunday ball game, but a slackening up in the rainfall, a postponement of the starting time one hour, and effective work by J. H. Carnahan's sawdust crew made the game a possibility. With the field all muddy and slippery, fast playing was of course a difficult thing, and errors, due to slippery ground and a soggy ball, were quite conspicuous, but the Klamath team proved to have just enough "muddy track horses" to get away with the game 8 to 2.

The team banded together by Harry Duke and Al Hughson has some real good players, and with the diamond in better shape, they should give the locals a closer game this afternoon and tomorrow. Furthermore, they are a gentlemanly lot of fellows, too, and there was a notable lack of growling. This spirit appealed to the fans, too, for they applauded the playing of the Sacramentans as much as they did the home guard, even calling upon Pitcher Wright to doff his cap after he had whiffed three in succession in the sixth.

Wright righted things for the All-Stars in the first inning, after Doyle, who started the game was derelict. It was after he had retired Johnson by throwing his grounder to first, and fanned Bowden that Doyle went bad. He walked Greenwood and Bogart, and each of these moved on when Nelson, after fanning, beat the ball to first. A wild pitch let Ginger score, and by issuing "four ball" passes to Bigbee and Clarke, Doyle walked Bogart in. Wright, a southpaw, then went in the box, and he ended the danger by striking out Allen.

Only three men faced Bigbee in the first and the same number in the second, one striking out, one hitting into Allen's hands, and the others being retired on infield grounders. Jimmie Clark fell down when he grabbed for Nixon's bunt, but from a sitting posture he threw to Nelson in time to make a put-out.

Hauser started matters for Sacramento in the third when he singled. He went out at second on a throw from Nelson. Kunz reaching first on the play. Wright then dumped one down in front of the plate, and Clark threw this a mile over Nelson's head. Wright reached second on this, and Kunz was caught at the plate by a throw to Clarke. Wright went to third on Johnston's single, and he and Johnston scored on Bogart's bad throw to first to catch Rooney.

Johnston of the visitors, be it known, is a brother of our own Tucker Johnston, who also guards centerfield territory, and who drew the final applause

yesterday by retiring the last man in the ninth by a brilliant one-handed stab of Hauser's drive.

With one down in the last of the third, Bogart singled, and he went to third after Nelson hit out a grounder easily three feet inside the third base line. By the time Umpire Crawford saw the ball it had rolled sideways, and he called it a foul, so Bogart went back to first. Nelson then went to first on balls, and the two runners advanced a base on a passed ball, and scored on Bigbee's single.

After some splendid pitching in the fourth, fifth and sixth innings, Wright went wrong in the seventh. He walked Johnston, Bowden singled, Greenwood did likewise, and Bogart drove one of the two-base variety over the right field fence. After Nelson and Bigbee went out, Jimmie Clarke smashed a two-bagger into deep left, scoring Bogart.

Little Talks on Health and Hygiene

Malaria is said to have hastened the downfall of Rome.

The mosquitoes which transmitted it were more deadly to the inhabitants of the Imperial City than their barbarian enemies. Much also has been written of similar injury to Greece in yet earlier times.

At least two diseases are carried by certain species of mosquitoes: malaria and yellow fever. All species are disagreeable pests. Have you unwittingly permitted mosquitoes to breed about your house or grounds? Even one bit of tomato can half filled by the spring rains makes an ideal breeding ground. It is surprising how many hidden pools one can find around a place if you really go on a hunt. Not infrequently drain pipes become clogged, and then tin roofs and gutters afford an unsuspected breeding place for thousands of mosquitoes.

Communities that suffer from these pests should co-operate to campaign effectively against them. Even the smallest adjacent pools should be filled up or ditched and drained. If these are too large to be filled they should be treated with petroleum. This floats atop the water and kills the mosquito larvae by shutting off the atmosphere.

When the wind causes a movement of the water which breaks up the oil coating, it must be re-oiled. Swamps can be similarly treated.

A survey should be made of all premises. Rain water barrels should be covered. Tin cans or discarded vessels on rubbish piles should be perforated, smashed flat or buried.
