Title to Championship Remains With Klamath

By decisively defeating Willows yesterday afternoon, Klamath Falls is still actively in the running for the championship of California and Oregon.

It was a real game, featured by the pitching of Lyle Bigbee, who allowed but one hit, a double to short left. Willows had the same lineup that defeated Klamath Falls at Dorris last Wednesday, except for Hoover in the box instead of Cook Henley.

Bigbee walked one, hit one, and struck out seven. Hoover walked one, hit none and struck out four. The first run came in the first inning, when Johnston hit through the box, was advanced by Bowden, and scored when Deacon at first dropped a throw. In the third Willows garnered their only two runs with one hit and errors by Nelson, Greenwood and Jolly. Klamath Falls gained two more in the fourth on an error and hits by Bogart and Bigbee. Bogart, Nelson and Bigbee hit in the sixth after two were out, making two more runs.

Eddie Bogart slammed the apple for three hits in four times at bat. Bigbee got two, Nelson, Johnson, Allen and Palmer one each. Ginger Greenwood booted two behind Bigbee, and Allen, Nelson and Jolly made an error. Except for these Willows would have been shut out.

Sam Jolly, the Dunsmuir catcher worked for Clarkag237-u.c.l. 2-story who worked in Clarke's place yesterday, caught a nice game. He didn't hit safely, but met the ball fairly every time up.

Only Willows, and perhaps Weed, can now dispute the claim of Klamath Falls for the championship of California and Oregon. Weed has not played the locals, but a game is hoped for.

The game yesterday was halted for some time when Stafford, second baseman for Willows, was stricken with an epileptic fit. He had to be carried from the field and removed to the care of a doctor.
