

Fair Fall Lumber Trade Predicted in Northwest

SEATTLE, July 11.—With a conservative manufacturing policy during the next two months, the Pacific Northwest lumber industry should enter the fall season on a sound basis, and with reasonable expectations of good business, according to Thorpe Babcock, secretary of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association, recently back from a tour of Eastern and Middle West lumber consuming centers. In discussing the situation Mr. Babcock said:

"The outlook for fall business is encouraging. Unless present indications are upset by some extraordinary development the West Coast mills will be called upon to fill orders for transcontinental rail delivery somewhat in excess of normal. It would seem that if a conservative policy of production is pursued for the next two months, values will be reasonably satisfactory."

be only a matter of a short time before values would be hammered below the cost line if full time operating was indulged in. This in turn would force a closing of the mills which recently have been able to operate and withhold their payrolls from the general prosperity of this part of the country. It is therefore a matter of vital interest that a conservative operating be the policy encouraged.

"The greatest natural heritage of the people of the states of Washington and Oregon is the forests. In the process of converting trees into lumber, vast amounts of new money will come into the regular channels through payrolls, but the fact should never be lost sight of that the trees themselves have a use value which it is just as important shall be obtained as it is that labor should be employed. So long as an intelligent co-operative manufacturing policy is followed, we will sell our forests for a reasonable return which will benefit everybody, but just so sure as over-production forces lumber prices to or below the actual cost of production, will we find ourselves in the position of giving away the timber itself. By the nature of the machinery of distribution to the final use, the ultimate consumer can never profit by lumber sold at the mills below the cost of production, and the only people who can eventually suffer by such a policy are those who lose the return which they should get for nature's gift."

"Improved conditions in the early spring of this year caused many mills heretofore idle to resume operations, and with this added capacity it would

Business Men Spending Month in Military Drill

MONTEREY, Calif., July 11.—"I can't get 'em up," sang the bugles at the citizens military training camp today, and out of their coats tumbled more than 2,000 business men, clerks, college students, professional men and those of diverse other callings who customarily waken to the tinkle of the well-known alarm clock.

The routine of camp life was on. For a month the student soldiers will engage in sham battles, march, drill, peel spuds, walk sentry beats in the wee sma' hours, do picket duty, take orders and otherwise comport themselves as befits aspirants to Uncle Sam's fighting forces.

Brigadier General William L. Sibert is camp commander. Regular army officers and non-coms have been detailed to act as instructors for the rookies, and they took them in hand in small squads today to teach them the rudiments of the business of war. One battalion of regulars was also on hand, to set a good example to the students.

In addition to their army routine, the civilians will engage during the month in bathing, athletic contests, boating, tennis, polo and other sports, on the shores of Monterey Bay.
