

U.S. Farmer is Ready for Emergency, Survey Says

NEW YORK, July 12.—There will be no necessity for bread tickets or meat diet restrictions in the United States, in case of invasion by any foreign foe, because the American farmer is prepared for emergencies. This is the lesson drawn from an agricultural preparedness survey just completed by the Rock Island railroad, as a voluntary contribution to the movement for industrial preparedness, inaugurated by the naval consulting board.

Emergency increases of from 10 to 50 per cent in the supply of breadstuffs and pork are possible in most of the Central Mississippi Valley states, according to statements made by directors of a dozen state experiment stations.

L. M. Allen, who had supervision of the work, states that the outstanding fact is the ability of the wheat, corn, and cotton states not only to sustain themselves, but to furnish the bulk of the nation's food supply, and to make quick changes in the farming program, should necessity arise. It appears, further, that the nation has available, generally efficient and convenient channels for reaching the farmer.

Movie Stars Are to Be on Exhibition for the Public

CHICAGO, July 12.—Here's your chance to meet your favorite movie actor or on the hoof. The exposition of the sixth annual convention of producers and actors and actresses of the screen opened in the Coliseum here today. The convention—the business part of the meeting—closed yesterday. The exposition will continue until July 18th.

The movie men's exposition is to be given over to the public and the public's favorite stars.

Your favorite, whether Bushman, Pickford, Chaplin, Bayne, Stewart, Clark, Dawn, or any one of scores of others, will be here to meet you in the flesh. The players will pose, and their pictures will be shown at the Coliseum within 24 hours after taking. Everybody is going to dance—public, stars, producers, exhibitors, all. Exhibitors will get acquainted with producers, the public will meet its stars; in fact, it is going to be a real get-together meeting

for those of, by or for motion pictures. Each day the crowd will be taken to some motion picture plant.

An organized effort to oust, or at least standardize the moving picture censor was planned at the convention. The league plans to show why it is that the "censors are tending to put the moving picture producers out of business."

"If there was a single national censor over all productions, conditions would not be so bad," a motion picture maker said today, "although we do not even sanction a national supervisor. The way it is now everybody censors us. There is a municipal supervisor, district supervisors of every size and description, and by the time they get through chopping our productions we haven't anything left. We are up against censorship in every form because we don't think we need it any more than the theater or the newspaper needs to be censored."

SKIM MILK WILL CUT FIRE RISK

EXPERT FINDS USE FOR PRODUCT OFTEN THROWN AWAY—MAY BE USED WHERE WATER IS INEFFECTIVE.

PORTLAND, July 12.—Instead of feeding skim milk to the hogs, farmers may use it in the manufacture of a fire-resistant covering for building purposes, especially shingles. This use of what farmers have sometimes considered practically a waste of the farm, is announced by Ernest McCullough of Chicago, a fire protection engineer for the cement industry.

Mr. McCullough says a mixture of cement and ordinary fine sand in a paste is effective as a fire retardant preparation for shingles, but it has the difficulty that the wood absorbs the water and the dry sand and cement blow away.

Skim milk, it is declared, is the medium used to hold intact the pigments in cold water paint, so by using skim milk without water the integrity of the paste is assured.

Furthermore, this use of skim milk in the preparation of certain paints is said to have long been known to the trade as a trade secret. Now it is given out to the general public so that any farmer can cover his own farm buildings with a fire retardant paint made from the skim milk from his own farm, together with cement and fine sand. It also makes a waterproofing paint.

FIRST STAGE OF PARALYSIS MAY BE IN MUSCLES

STABLE FLIES MAY TRANSMIT TERRIBLE DISEASE

State Health Officer Gives Out Warnings Concerning Infantile Paralysis—Soreness in Muscles First Notice of Disease—Physician Should Be Consulted Early.

PORTLAND, July 12.—"Infantile paralysis in the early stages is similar in effect to rheumatism. Great care should be taken at the first evidence of any sickness of this kind in children under 5 years of age. Consult a regular physician, one who has been schooled in medicine and who will be able to detect the disease and immediately report it to the health authorities. Stay away from the anti-medical practitioners."

Such is the warning given by Dr. David N. Roberg, state health officer, as result of the epidemic of infantile paralysis in New York. Dr. Roberg says that there are no known cases in the state at present although two cases were reported in eastern Oregon in May. These were not verified, however.

"The first notice of the disease," said Dr. Roberg, "is the soreness of the muscles. Pains are felt in the back and neck, and resemble rheumatic pains. On account of the soreness of muscles and pains some people will take their children to masseurs and anti-medical practitioners, which is the very thing they should not do. They are unskilled in detecting the disease and may be the cause of the start of an epidemic."

"Stable flies have been known to transmit the disease, while it is also communicable from the secretion from the mouth and nose. About the only thing which can be done upon discovery of the disease is to quarantine the person ill. Very little is known about the treatment of the disease and there is no vaccine which can be used to prevent it."

"While the state and the city is to take every precaution possible, upon the first symptoms of the disease notice should be given immediately to the proper health authorities. Once an epidemic has started it is almost impossible to control."

SAN FRANCISCO, July 12.—A strangely ideal life, in which there is no mention of war or the world's inharmonies, where courts are not needed and families live in Arcadian simplicity, is described by Mrs. E. W. Sprague, wife of Captain Sprague of the steamer Columbia, now in port from the island of Navva, in the Fiji group.

There are but ninety white people on the island. They are practically out of touch with the remainder of the world, and care little for it. They have a school system in which the mother is the only teacher. They allow no talk of the present war, and allow no discussions to arise. The visitor is treated with the utmost hospitality, and kept busy for days telling of the outside world, Mrs. Sprague says. She declares the people give no indication of dissatisfaction with their simple life.
