NO MORE SLIDES

GOVERNOR OF PANAMA CANAL ZONE TO RESIGN—SAYS HIS WORK IS FINISHED, SO WANTS TO BE RELIEVED

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 12.—General George Goethals, governor of the Panama canal zone, expected to resign his post today. The White House authorizes the following statement: "General Goethals wants to be relieved, because he feels that his work has been finished. The president expressed a willingness to leave the matter entirely in Goethals' hands."

General Goethals has informed President Wilson that all danger from further slides in the canal is past.

LOCAL MEN WILL DRAW FOR LAND

350,000 ACRES ARE TO BE RAFFLED IN COLVILLE INDIAN RESERVATION IN WASHINGTON—MANY THOUSAND REGISTER

To draw for land in the Colville Indian reservation in Washington, when 350,000 acres are thrown open on July 27th, two cars of local men will be on the ground to take their chances.

Johnny Hubbard, Archie Wishard and F. O. Greenwood will leave in a car tomorrow, while George J. Walton, A. A. Mehaffey, Earl Hill and Bob Sloan are already on their way, having left for Spokane Monday morning. Two or three cars of Dorris people also will leave soon to take part in the lottery.

Land offices were thrown open July 5th for those who want to participate in one of Uncle Sam's last great land raffles. Approximately 350,000 acres, comprising the south half of the Colville Indian reservation, will be divided into 160-acre ranches and turned over to settlers who hold the lucky numbers after the drawing July 27th.

Registration books opened today in Spokane, Wenatchee, Wilbur, Republic, Omak and Colville, Wash. They will close July 22d, and a week later the lucky numbers will be drawn out, entitling the holder to a choice of 160 acre tracts.

The Colville reservation is less than fifty miles from Spokane. It extends from the Columbia River on the east and south to the Okanogan River on the west. It is about seventy miles east and west, and forty miles north and south. The elevation varies from 1,000 to 6,000 feet. Stock raising probably will become the greatest industry of the land thrown open to entry.

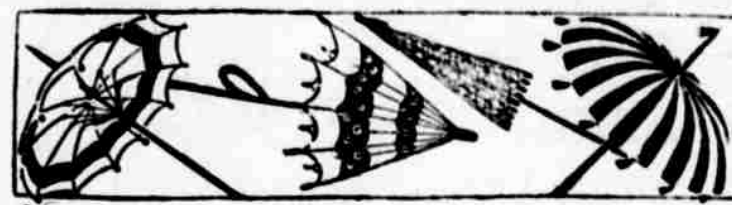
