Birth Control Speakers Cannot Have an Exhibit

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 14.—Without the police interference that has marked meetings of birth control advocates in other cities, Mrs. Robert Liggett of Duluth today lectured here on control, before several hundred Minnesota women and girls.

Mrs. Margaret Sanger of New York assisted in distributing literature on birth control. The Minnesota law does not prohibit the dissemination of information on this subject. But a clinic at which the subject was to have been discussed more generally, with maps, charts and wax figures, was declared contrary to law. The exhibit was abandoned.

Mrs. Liggett recently got her name in the papers by advocating at Seattle that women of the lower classes be segregated as breeders, that no high strung woman of the upper classes should be subjected to motherhood and that no child in the world is worth the pain it takes to bring it into existence. Mrs. Sanger recently went free from a federal indictment in New York charging her with sending obscene matter through the mails in her birth control magazine, "The Woman Rebel." New York society men and women, Miss Fola Lafollette among them, publicly supported what Mrs. Sanger had done.

FILING ON WATER HOLES, LAVA BEDS

REPORTS FROM MERRILL SAYS SEVERAL PARTIES HAVE DISCOVERED WATER IN SCENE OF INDIAN WAR

According to reports reaching here from Merrill, several people are filing on water holes said to have been discovered in the lava beds, the scene of most of the historic Modoc War. Men from the Churchill ranch are said to be among those who have gone to Altimas to make filing on these holes.

The lava beds have long been known as excellent grazing territory, especially for sheep, but lack of water has greatly reduced this value. Most of the grazing has been done in the winter, when the lava beds are free from snow, although all surrounding territory is often covered with snow.

If the reports of discovery of water holes in the lava beds at this time of the year are true, it will mean that stock may be grazed there the year around.
