TO TRAP VESSEL AS SHE RETURNS

BRITISH PLAN TO WAIT FOR THE DEUTCHLAND AND CATCH HER WHEN SHE PASSES THROUGH ENGLISH CHANNEL

United Press Service BALTIMORE, July 18.—It is reported here that the British plan to trap the German submarine merchantman Deutchland in the English channel on her return voyage.

The United States government has barred a wireless message from Tuckerton to officers of the Deutchland. It is believed the submarine will leave tonight, as her cargo has been loaded. "We cannot speak concerning the time the Deutchland will leave. Anything we say regarding that will be a lie," said an official of the department of war.
