HURD SPEAKS AT CHURCH SESSION

J. B. MASON IS APPOINTED ON COMMITTEE ON PRESBYTERY RECORDS—BOTH RETURNED LAST EVENING.

Rev. Charles T. Hurd and J. B. Mason returned last evening from Eugene where they attended the twenty-sixth annual session of the Presbyterian Synod of Oregon. At the session Thursday evening Rev. Hurd addressed the synod on "The Place and Importance of the Young People's Societies in the Life of the Church."

Mr. Mason was appointed by the Synod on the committee on Presbyterian records.

Before going to the synod, Rev. Hurd spent a week at Newport, one of his former pastures.

With the object of giving every church the backing of a strong organization, a report was adopted at Thursday's session of the synod, urging that the churches in the towns gradually absorb the weaker associations in the surrounding rural districts and conduct them as branches or missions. This move was proposed by the home missions committee in a report presented by Rev. Henry Marotte of Portland. The synod went on record as strongly opposing the establishment of any new Presbyterian church in districts already adequately supplied by other denominations. It is hoped by these methods to overcome the evils of too many struggling and dying churches.
