CHINESE PRODUCTS ADMITTED

NOT EVEN an unfettered democrat would dare to vote for a bill for the admission of Chinese labor to this country, but the democratic congress passed and a democratic president signed an act which admits the product of Chinese labor. What is the difference? If we admit the Chinese laborer, he at least spends a small portion of his earnings here. If we buy the products of his labor "made in China" we do not get even that much. If we admit the Chinese laborer, he will use American raw materials in his work here. If we admit the product of his labor he uses Chinese raw materials.

The democrats have, therefore, done worse for us than to admit Chinese labor. Prior to 1890 we imported practically all our tin plate from Wales and other European countries. A republican tariff gave the American manufacturer the needed protection, and we built up a successful tin plate industry in this country. The democrats cut the duty in 1913, with the result that we have been importing immense quantities from Wales, even since the war began, and now we are getting tin plate from China. We shall get it in large quantities unless the tariff duties are raised again. China has the iron for the plates, the tin for the coating, the coal for the foundries and the cheap labor for manufacture. American workmen do not propose to accept the Chinese standard of wages and living.

THE Wilson administration interprets the increase in receipts from individual income taxes as an evidence of increased prosperity. It certainly indicates increased prosperity among the people whose incomes exceed \$4,000 annually, for nearly every man has an exemption to that amount. It also indicates that we are collecting a larger portion of national revenue from our own people and less of it from the foreign importer.

FEW WAR BABIES BORN IN CANADA

STATISTICS SHOW THAT ILLEGITIMACY HAS DECREASED SINCE THE WAR STARTED—MORE BOY BABIES

United Press Service WINNIPEG, Man., July 24—More Canadian male babies have been born than ever before since Canada went to war, and illegitimacy has greatly decreased during the war period.

Vital statistics available today show that in 23 months 11,794 babies were born. Of these 6,170 were boys and 5,624 girls. During the preceding 23 months 5,710 boys and 5,384 girl babies were born.

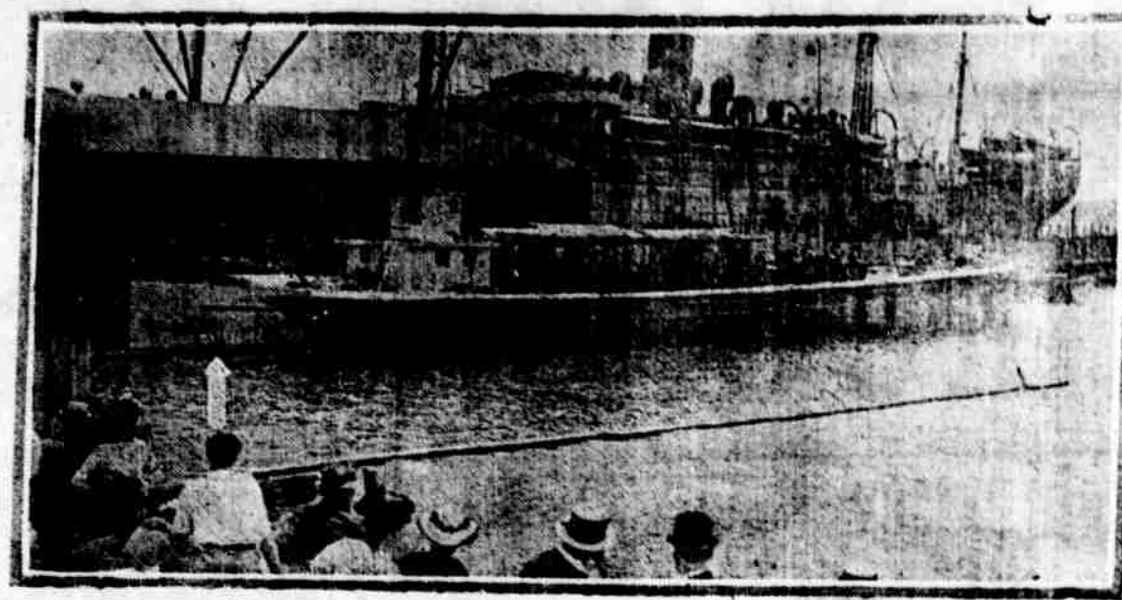
During the war period 561 illegitimate babies have been born, while the highest of any preceding 23 months show 726 babies born out of wedlock. All figures are based on reports from the city of Winnipeg.

Germans, in Deadly Fear, Hide Merchant Submarine

In deadly fear that someone will blow up or try to injure the merchant submarine Deutschland, the Germans in charge of her have hidden her away in Baltimore harbor so it is almost impossible for the public to get a glimpse of her. She is alongside a pier, and is flanked on the opposite side by a barge. At one end is the high wall of a warehouse, and at the other is a tug.

Strung along warehouse and the pier is barbed wire. Extending out from the barge is a boom, and from this boom wire netting is dropped to the bottom, so that the only possible approach to the vessel is from directly above. Even a view of more than the periscope and an occasional outline of the deck is impossible. The boat in the distance is the German interned merchantman Neckar.

Forecasts Overseas Air Service Within a Year

NEW YORK, July 24.—An overseas aeroplane service between Europe and America and veritable aeroplane armies in the clouds on European battlefields are expected by a French aerial expert, who talked about the probability today to materialize within the present year. He pointed to the trip of the giant submarine from Germany to Baltimore as justification for what might otherwise be termed a wild guess.

"There are going to be flocks and flocks of aeroplanes used on both sides and aerial battles, with aeroplane armies, will become important features of the great war," said he.

"How to transport guns and ammunition by air is a matter that is receiving expert attention now. Aeroplanes are being used that can carry a 500-pound bomb, and they are so steady and safe that when the bomb is dropped the pilot does not note any lightening of the load.

"To be able to transport light cannon this way from one part of the line to another would be a tremendous advantage, and it is safe to prophesy that this will be done before long.

"Clouds of aeroplanes are going to darken the sky before the war is over, and some of them will be huge air transports in overseas commerce. The aeroplane has only begun to be used."

Farmers in Politics to Stop Market Gambling

BISMARCK, N. D., July 24.—Farmers launched a nation-wide fight here today to stop gambling on grain and farm products in all stock markets of the United States. The movement is backed by the Non-Partisan Political League of North Dakota, whose membership has just swept the state of North Dakota clean, in the recent primaries. Every state candidate nominated was theirs. They were undefeated everywhere.

Their fight was featured by three factors. It was launched by farmers, yet was sponsored and enthusiastically supported by labor and union men of North Dakota's cities. Although various farmers' granges and individual clubs form the party, it remained a unit, without splits or jealousies.

Its ranks and leaders were assembled without reference to religion, politics or nationality, but for the single object of the complete abolition of all gambling with grains and foods.

Following the sweeping victory in North Dakota, league leaders are enrolling farmers of Minnesota for a similar fight. When Minnesota is swung it is planned to make the movement national, picking up socialists where farmers are in the minority.

Sealed proposals will be received by the Recorder of the City of Merrill, Oregon, until August 12, 1916, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. (at which time proposals to purchase will be opened and considered) for the purchase of \$3,800, or any part thereof, city of Merrill refunding bonds, payable July 1, 1931, with the option of the city to pay them, or any of them in numerical order, from and after July 1, 1921; said bonds to be issued in denominations of \$500 and one bond in the sum of \$300.
