THE BORDER FOR NEW ENLISTMENTS

NO VOLUNTEER COMPANIES WILL BE FORMED UNTIL THE THIRD INFANTRY REGIMENT ON BORDER IS COMPLETED

According to a letter received this morning by Captain O. C. Applegate, no companies of soldiers will be formed in Oregon until the Third Infantry of Oregon, now at the border, is filled up. The letter comes from the acting adjutant general at Portland, Walter W. Wilson. It follows:

"Your letter of July 15, 1916, has been duly received at these headquarters.

"I wish to assure you that I greatly appreciate the interest which you have taken in regard to organizing a unit for our state. However, we have had no additional calls from the government for more troops, and have been informed by the government that we will receive no further calls until we

have filled up the Third Infantry, now at the border.

"This office has no connection whatever with volunteers, however, I will take it upon myself personally to speak to Colonel Gantenbein, as you request.

"Our recruiting officer for the Third Infantry will be at Eugene July 30, 31 and August 1, and at Roseburg August 4, 5, and 6. These two towns are probably the closest he will get to your city, and I take this occasion to inform you that any men between the ages of 18 and 45 years, physically qualified, who desire to enlist for duty at the border, should go to these towns, at their own expense. The recruiting officer would receive them at these points and from there on there would be no additional expense to those applying. We have orders to the effect that those enlisting at this time will be forwarded to the Mexican border. I feel as though possibly there are a few young men at each town desiring to enlist, so I am forwarding this information, asking you to please give it to those interested."

of trouble makers then turned upon the poor, one-armed umpire, and talked the latter into letting him go back to second. The ground rules made before the game, according to Manager Watt, said that a runner could make as many bases as possible, but had to make them all when the ball went out of fair territory. Shortly tried to make four bases on the ball that went among the autos, and when caught insisted that he would be allowed only two, and hence was not out at the plate.

It was a great day for Lyle Bigbee. He allowed only two hits, and one of them could have been called an error. It was a pop infield fly, and dropped between Bigbee, Nelson and Bogart. Klamath Falls hammered Ade Sieberts, the Medford pitcher, for ten bingles, everybody except Bowden and Jolly getting at least one. The big clout of the game was a two-bagger by Carman, which went far over the left field fence.

The run getting commenced in the fourth, when Bogart lived on an error by Miles, Nelson hit, Bigbee lived on an error by Scholz, and Greenwood smashed a clean one to right field. Two more were annexed in the fifth without a hit. Here Miles again figured strongly in Klamath's scoring.

The ninth was a regular slugfest. Clarke started with a double to right, Jolly sent him to third on a sacrifice fly. Carman sent one over the fence. Bogart drove one through short, and Nelson reached first on a bullet clout that made Miles jump into the air and let the ball go under his feet.

Four new men appeared in Medford suits. T. Baker and C. Baker from Portland, Loeff from Oregon Agricultural College, and McIntyre from

Northern California. Not one of them got a hit off Bigbee, although Loeff showed some Tucker Johnson activity in center field.

Medford was very confident before the game. But when Bigbee struck out the first two men at bat in the first inning, enthusiasm began to wane. Five men faced Bigbee in the fourth inning, and in all other innings not more than four faced him. In four of the innings only three batters stepped into the batter's box.
