

Campaign Cost Bill May Deal Blow This Year

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 25.—A corrupt practices bill introduced by Senator Owen of Oklahoma placing rigid restrictions on money spending by candidates for office has run the house gauntlet successfully, and with the administration's solid support, is waiting today to be pushed in the senate so as to be effective for this year's presidential and congressional campaign.

"You can't buy a cigar for an old-time constituent under that bill," asserted an indignant house member, as the measure was about to pass there. Its friends declare it makes slush-funds, jack-pots and expenditures out of the reach of the ordinary man, impossible. Under penalty of a fine up to \$10,000, imprisonment of not less than a year, and—in the case of a candidate for office illegally elected under its provisions—disqualification for his office. The bill forbids candidates to promise offices in return for support; expenditures other than costs of meetings, literature, and other specified items; corporations or their officers to contribute to a campaign fund; importing money into a congressional district to affect the congressional election; newspapers to run "puffs" without labeling them "paid ads"; with-

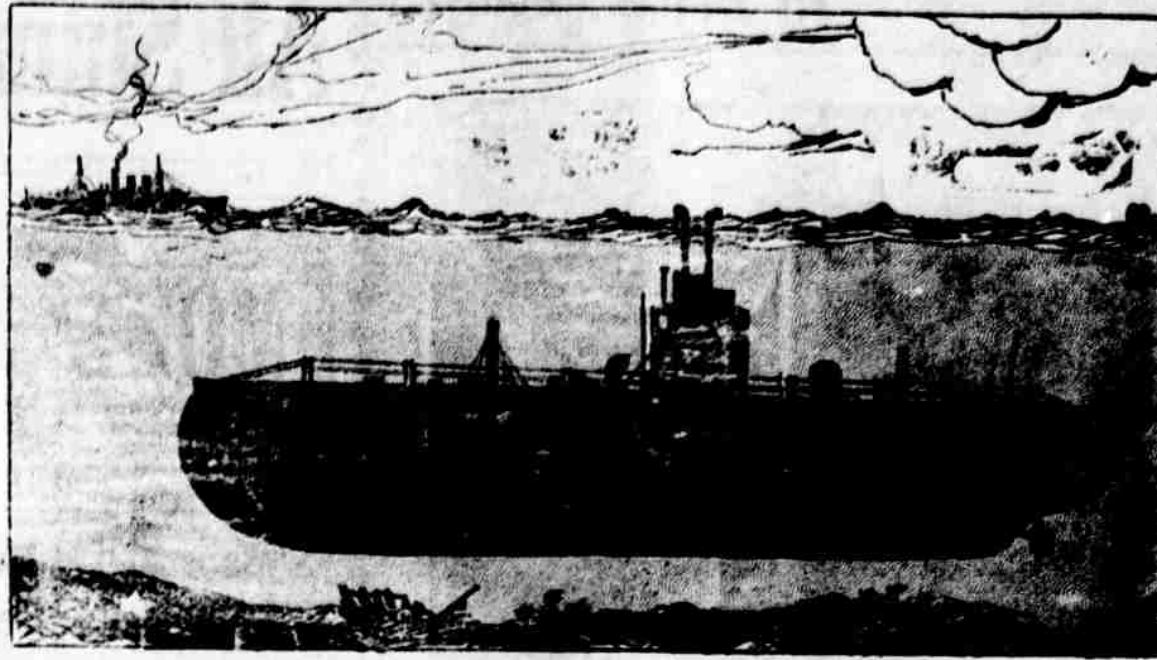
drawal of ads or patronage from a newspaper because of a political stand. A president may not have more than \$50,000 spent to obtain his nomination; a vice president is limited to \$25,000; a senator may spend \$5,000 for nomination or election; a congressman \$2,500. In addition, the national committees may spend \$100,000 for their presidential tickets; and the national congressional committees the same amount. National officers are criminally liable if more is spent.

No money over \$50 may be spent by any individual for a candidate, acting for himself alone.

When individuals organize into clubs they must register with the clerk of the house of representatives, keep a public account of all funds received at Washington. The total any man may spend, whether as an individual or as a club member, or both, is \$5,000. The fine and imprisonment clauses are not discretionary with the court. Anyone found guilty must be imprisoned one year. Convicted candidates, too, must lose the place to which they were illegally elected.

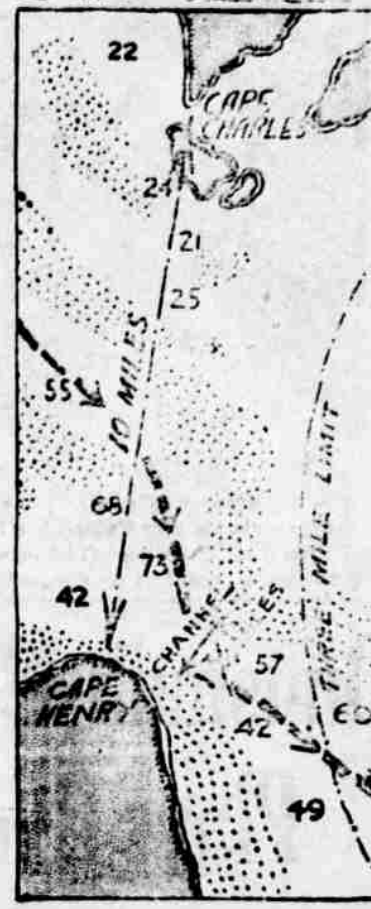
Witnesses who testify for the state are granted full immunity; except for perjury committed on the stand. Each and every person who handles, receives or pays out money illegally under this act, is individually criminally responsible.

How Deutschland Must Sneak Out in 60 ft. of Water



The deepest channel for the Deutschland in her trip out Chesapeake Bay is sixty feet at the three-mile limit, and it is close along the shore near Cape Henry. The British warships will be waiting to attack unless she submerges before she reaches the open sea. The supreme test of the navigating ability of Captain Paul Koenig and the success of the German merchant submarine will come on this trip out of the mouth of Chesapeake Bay. The British warships are hovering off the three mile limit beyond Cape Henry and Charles. He must submerge before he reaches that line, else he will be sunk.

But at the line there are only sixty feet of water. The depth of the Deutschland from superstructure to keel is forty feet, and that means the periscopes, wireless and other masts must be taken down so they will not show above the surface of the water. In sixty feet of water the Deutschland will have ten feet above her and ten feet beneath her at the deepest part of the channel. Some navigators believe she will approach the three mile limit and then rest on the bottom till darkness. At night she may be able to go out with her periscopes a few feet above the waves.



International Socialist Conference Urges Peace

PARIS, July 1.—(By mail)—That three great socialist organizations of the United States are working hand in hand with the socialist organizations of all the belligerent countries for peace became known here today for the first time with the publication of the minutes and orders of the day of the recent second international socialist conference of Zimmerwald, held in May at Kienthal, Switzerland.

Nearly every belligerent country tried to discourage the conference by refusing to permit delegates appointed to attend. Nevertheless the conference was held and a peace program adopted.

Among the socialist organizations represented at the conference were the socialist labor party of the United States, the socialist party of America and the German language group of the socialist party of America, giving the socialists of the United States the largest representation in the movement of any neutral country. Several belligerent countries were equally well represented.

Of the twenty-eight national socialist bodies that adhered to the congress and peace program two are Italian, one Swiss, two English, one Rumanian, four Russian, Jewish, Lithuanian and Polish, two Bulgarian, one Portuguese, one from Spain, one from Salonika, one from Sweden and Norway, one from Denmark, one from Southern Africa, various German socialist organizations, one from Holland, one from France together with the new French socialist committee for the resumption of international relations.

In the appeal launched by the congress to the socialists of the entire world the following stand against a "decisive victory" was taken:

"Your government and your newspaper tell you it is necessary to continue this war in order that it can be made the last war that can ever happen. In this they are deceiving you. War never has killed war. On the contrary, in exciting the sentiments and the interests of revenge, war prepares war; violence calls forth violence. There is but one means definitely to prevent future wars, and that is the conquest of government and capitalist property by the people themselves. A durable peace will be the fruit of triumphant socialism."

The order of the day, relative to the immediate inauguration of a definite peace program and propaganda, closes as follows:

"It is therefore necessary for all socialists to exercise the maximum pressure on representatives in government. It will be necessary to exact the immediate co-operation of the governments and the capitalists with the socialist party. It will be necessary to exact that all parliamentarians vote from now on against all war credits demanded for the purpose of prolonging the war, and to demand at once an immediate armistice."

Allies May Issue Paper Concerning Poles Status

PETROGRAD, July 24.—It was learned here today that Russia, England and France may soon issue a joint statement clearly outlining the allies' position regarding Poland's autonomy. This would be done at Russia's invitation. The Poles believe the allies have made themselves the champions of right against might, weak against strong, of small nation against large one.

An article about this matter by Gasparine Menshikov has just been published here in the Novoye Vremia. It is significant because the writer has been unsympathetic towards the Poles' aspirations, because he frequently reflects opinion in the higher bureaucratic circles of Russia. Recently, in Switzerland, a group of Poles drew up a memorial urging Russia to take the initiative with the entente powers and conclude an agreement whereby upon the conclusion of victorious war the kingdom of Poland should be reunited, autonomous in her administration, church, education, justice, finance, communications and legislation, but with customs, foreign relations and army under the control of Russia. Menshikov expressed his approval of this idea. In addition, he said:

SAYS OREGON IS ENTITLED TO ALL

PORTLAND CHAMBER OF COMMERCE SAYS OREGON RIGHT. FULLY SHOULD HAVE EVEN MORE THAN 40 PER CENT

The following vital information on the apportionment of the money received from the California-Oregon land grant fund is sent out by Portland Chamber of Commerce, and explains why Oregon is entitled to all of the 40 per cent of the fund to be spent on reclamation work:

"In March, 1913, F. H. Newell, director of the reclamation service, recommended that \$450,000 be set aside to co-operate with the state of Oregon in reclamation work. At that time Oregon had already appropriated \$450,000 for work on the Tumalo project, which work was begun in June, 1913. In August of that year Secretary Lane visited Oregon and congratulated the state on its progressive work, and reiterated his promise to give us consideration. The \$450,000 was never made available and never spent, but it is not the purpose, at this time to enter into any discussion of that matter, more

than to show that Oregon has done more for herself in the way of reclamation than has any other state, and has received proportionately less from the federal government.

"The state completed the Tumalo project by a direct appropriation of \$450,000. The state appropriated \$50,000 to be used with a like sum from the government in co-operative investigations. These funds were expended and surveys made. It was anticipated by this state that following this co-operative work, funds would be made available by the reclamation service to carry forward some of this meritorious work.

"The service has in the past allotted to Oregon about \$7,000,000, but has actually expended only a little more than \$3,000,000, the balance reverting to the general reclamation fund. From the fact that over \$10,000,000 has been put into the reclamation fund from sale of timber in our national forests, it seems that Oregon should receive more than a third of that sum.

"If the entire 40 per cent of the Oregon-California grant fund, now apportioned to the reclamation fund, were spent in Oregon, she would yet have received less than has been supplied at that fund. Mere justice to the state should cause the expenditure of that fund here, not taking into any consideration Oregon's right to the proceeds of the sale of these grant lands."
