

Chicago to Stage Wild Western Celebration

(Herald Special Service)
CHICAGO, July 18.—A most unusual celebration that will reproduce and picture the old and new West—from its inception to the present day—is to be given at the old Cuba ball park in that city. Nine consecutive days and nights, commencing Saturday, August 10th, and closing August 27th. The honorary judges are: Colonel W. F. Cody (Buffalo Bill) of Wyoming, R. H. Russell of Montana, Wm. Dahlman of Nebraska, Burke Burnett of Fort Worth, Texas, and J. W. Lynch of Ponca City, Oklahoma.

It goes without saying that an array of judges composed of national celebrities such as well known as all of the above, will do more to insure a real "Round-Up" than anything of the sort that has ever been attempted before. The leading and public spirited men of Chicago who are fathering the enter-

prises are giving every support to make the "Round-Up" festival the biggest frontier celebration ever staged. (Chicago, really the Mecca of the stock man and cowboy, will "turn itself over" to welcome its Western brothers. The committee superintending the enterprise desiring to do something that will give entertainment to the cowboys and cowgirls who will participate in the competitions, have arranged to produce two big spectacles, "The Birth and Passing of the West" and "Preparedness." This is the first time a spectacular feature has ever been made part of a "Round-Up" and frontier exhibition, and more than a thousand men, women, Indians and horses will participate.

Arthur V. Hotland, who has charge of the scenic equipment of big "out-door" spectacles, will personally superintend the decorating and lighting of the park and the designing of the scenic equipment required for these massive scenes, which, by the way, will be the largest ever constructed, having a total length of more than 900 feet and a height of more than 60 feet.

IRISHMAN GOES ON TRIAL TODAY

MEMBER OF PARLIAMENT IS ACCUSED OF VIOLATING THE DEFENSE OF THE REALM ACT BY TALKING TO IRISH PRISONERS

LONDON, July 28.—Laurence Ginnell, author, humanitarian and prominent Irish member of the British parliament, was placed on trial here today by his government, charged with violating the defence of the realm act. Penalties for conviction of the violation of this act range from a ten shilling fine to imprisonment.

Ginnell was arrested by order of General Lloyd. Information came to the officer that Ginnell had visited a detention camp at Knutsford, near Manchester, under an assumed name, and there spent some time talking in a suspicious manner with Irish rebel prisoners. Ginnell has long been known for his sympathy with the Irish cause. He has frequently and openly criticized the government for not giving Ireland home rule. He was particularly bitter in denouncing the government for what he termed its failure to deal more leniently with the Irish rebels following the Easter rebellion.

Ginnell is a member from County Westmeath, a hotbed of Irish rebellion, from which he was elected in 1906. He is a self-educated man and a fine natural orator. He was one of the founders of the Irish Literary Society of London, and is the author of several books dealing with Irish questions.

MAJOR'S OFFICE IS A MUD SHACK

THE MOST INSIGNIFICANT STRUCTURE IN COLUMBUS IS THE HEADQUARTERS FOR THE COMMANDMENT OF THE BASE

COLUMBUS, N. M., July 28.—Possibly the most insignificant structure in Columbus camp today is used as United States headquarters and the office of Major C. S. Farnsworth, commandant of the base. It is a V-shaped building of mud, or adobe, with a canvas roof. The flag floating over it is the only thing to distinguish it as headquarters.

The ceilings are low and the few windows badly chinked with mud. When the wind blows the major turns up his collar and puts on his goggles. On the earth pine boards have been laid for floors. Adobe, unadorned, forms the walls of the office. A sheet iron stove is set in a box of sand. The walls are covered with detail maps of Mexico and Chihuahua, showing the truck routes and water holes.

In the outer office alert orderlies wait for orders to rush messages to the wireless station or telegraph office.
