## NEW ROAD WILL AVOID BIG HILL

PETITION IS FILED FOR ROAD AROUND LEWIS HILL, EAST OF TOWN TO AVOID STEEP GRADE. HAS LONG BEEN WANTED

The road over what is known as the Lewis hill, just out of Klamath Falls on the Keno road, probably will be changed to lead around the hill. A petition, signed by nineteen taxpayers in the district between here and Keno has been placed before the county court, asking this change in the road. County Judge Hanks said this morning that the court was favorable to the change. The new road will be about 4,000 feet long from the place it leaves the present road to the point where it again joins. This distance is slightly more than the length of the present road, but the proposed road will avoid a long, steep grade.

## Three Doctors in Boston Tragedy



Dr. Eldridge D. Atwood, a Boston osteopath, shot Dr. Wilfred E. Harris, president of the Massachusetts College of Osteopathy, because, he charged, Dr. Harris had been intimate with Dr. Celio Adams, another osteopath. Dr. Atwood was or had been engaged to marry her, and she made a confession to him. The shooting took place a short time after Dr. Adams was found dying in her office, where she was believed to have taken poison. All those connected with the tragedy stood high in osteopathic circles in Boston.

## KLAMATH FALLS HAS \$1,125,204

ONE OF FIRST SIXTEEN TOWNS IN THE STATE WITH BANK DEPOSITS OF OVER ONE MILLION DOLLARS

SALEM, July 28.—Sixteen cities of Oregon have 78 1/2 per cent of the banking capital and 79 per cent of the bank deposits of the state, according to figures compiled by State Bank Superintendent Sargent. Portland alone, he says, has 48 per cent of the capital and 55 per cent of the deposits of the state. Sixteen cities having over \$1,000,000 deposits each have 41 state and 33 national banks. Their capital stock and surplus total \$19,816,663.04 and deposits \$102,418,026.54. All other towns have 136 state and 51 national banks, \$7,039,414.52 capital and surplus and \$29,946,493.75 deposits.
