Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt is very busy caring for the helpless widows of National Guardsmen. She has kept many of them from actual suffering. Major Cornelius Vanderbilt, her husband, is on the Texas border with General O'Ryan, who is in command of the New York State troops. When young Vanderbilt in 1896 married Grace Wilson, his father, Cornelius disinherited him. He didn't like the new Mrs. Vanderbilt. But the two are the only persons of the family of New York millionaires who have been heard of in connection with the nation's need.

SUSPECT IN THE BOMB OUTRAGE WILL FACE CHARGE OF CRIMINAL CONSPIRACY—TRIALS TO BE RUSHED

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 3.—District Attorney Fickert announced this morning that Julius Cohn, a suspect in connection with the preparedness parade outrage, will be charged with criminal conspiracy, and not with murder. Preparations for the trial of all the indicted men are being rushed. Detectives are busy investigating the alibis furnished by the suspects. More evidence favoring the prosecution is daily being found.

Adjourn Next Month
WASHINGTON, C. Aug. 3.—After conferring with President Wilson this morning, Senator Lewis predicted that congress would adjourn between September 1 and 8.

WATER POWER BILL GOES OVER

BELIEVED THAT COMPROMISE BILL FOR POWER SITES AND NAVIGABLE STREAMS CANNOT BE AGREED UPON

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 3.—It was learned today that the compromise bill for federal control of water power sites and navigable streams will not pass at this session of congress. President Wilson desires that conferees from the radically opposed sides should agree before he supports the measure.
