WILSONIAN FLUCTUATIONS

WRITING to the Indianapolis Star, L. W. Merriam, a former progressive, gives a number of reasons why Americans should vote for Hughes and Fairbanks. The reasons all illustrate the proposition that President Wilson has not "made good." In a series of staccato sentences, Mr. Merriam recounts as follows some of the president's fluctuations:

"He favored the Garrison continental plan; he fired Garrison and jumped that."

"He opposed young men being trained for military service; then he demanded that 400,000 of them be trained."

"He opposed increasing the navy; then he demanded the largest navy in the world."

"He opposed intervention in Mexico, and then sent an army to intervene."

"He demanded that all the Mexican claimants get together and establish a de facto government and threatened non-recognition of any one who refused; then he recognized Carranza, the only claimant who did not and would not join the conference."

"He favored free Panama canal tolls; then he forced the democratic majority to repeal the free tolls law."

"He opposed preparedness last year, and favors it this year."

The assertion that the president has kept the country out of war with Europe provokes the Star's correspondent to terse comment:

"This country has never been in danger of war with any European nation. Hungry men don't shoot the cook—at least before breakfast—and European nations realized that a break with this country meant an embargo on foodstuffs; and that, above everything else on earth, they could not have sustained while at war at home."

Can anyone assert that there is a word in all the above that is untrue? The floundering in Mexico has been a serious business, and before the end is reached it may become more so. At this stage who is there that can see the end?

England Ready for Peace Now--On Her Own Terms

Worries of War Have Not Discouraged Her--Determined to Crush Prussian Militarism No Matter What the Cost Will Be.

LONDON, July 12.—(By mail)—This story has to run several hundreds so as to match up with Ackerman's, Sir Wood's and Hearley's. Otherwise it could be told in ten words, thus: England is ready for peace now—on her own terms.

She is just as ready as she was the day after war was declared. War weariness has not discouraged her. The awful drain of blood and money, the knowledge that every day's prolongation of the struggle means a bigger bill in both to pay, has not abated her zeal or released her determination to win what she went to war for. The military reverses of the last year have stiffened her purpose to accomplish a peace that will remove forever the "menace of Prussian militarism."

Yes, there is a peace-at-any-price party in England. But its members are negligible, its influence is nil. Some half dozen of them are in parliament because there has been no general election since war began. As proof of this, witness the special election in Merthyr Tydfil, South Wales, the red-hot socialist constituency in all Britain. Keir Hardy, ever a consistent peace advocate, has represented Merthyr Tydfil in commons for fifteen years. When he died his seat was contested by two members of the labor party, Stanton and Winston, the former a supporter of Britain's war, the latter a Hardie pacifist. Stanton had the nerve to tell the coal miners he was for continuing the war to the finish, even if it meant conscription twice over, and they elected him by a vote of 10,256 to 6,680. If Morrell, Snowden, Trevelyan, Outhwaite, Pringle or Mason, all from far less radical constituencies, should stand for re-election, there can be little doubt as to the result. The British public and its government servants don't always agree on great questions. There has been much popular dissatisfaction with the war cabinet. The diplomatic blunders whereby Bulgaria was lost and Germany enabled to overrun Serbia and Montenegro and involve the entente in serious difficulties with Greece; the military miscalculations which resulted in the evacuation of Gallipoli and the surrender of General Townshend's forces at Kut-el-Amara; the failure to exert a stronger economic pressure on Germany by tightening the blockade; neglect to intern enemy aliens in England, etc., etc.—on these matters sections of the public have expressed their opinions strongly.

On the question of peace, statesmen and common folk with the unimportant exception referred to, are one. There has been no criticism of the replies of Premier Asquith and Foreign Secretary Grey to Germany's peace overtures.

England is ready for peace on her own terms. England's terms are those of her allies. The general principles for which she is fighting have been repeatedly stated. Only one of her specific terms which the allies endorse has been laid down; that is the restoration of Belgium. The German chancellor's recent tentative offer to create a new Belgium, not a Franco-English vassal, but between whose people and the Germans there should be the collaboration of neighbors, brought a prompt and specific response from the British premier:

"We, the allies, are determined to see once more the old Belgium. She must not be allowed to suffer permanently from the wanton and wicked invasion of her freedom. That which has been broken down must be repaired and restored." As for the other terms, Britishers feel that it would be futile to discuss them now. Here is what Sir Edward Grey says on this point:

"The first step toward peace will come when the German government begins to recognize the fact that the allies are not beaten and are not going to be. The one thing that is more responsible than anything else for the prolongation of the war is that the German government goes on telling the German people that they have won the war, that the allies are already beaten. If any of the allies have a special right to talk peace at this time, it is France on whom for weeks past the concentrated fury of the German attack has fallen. But France is not talking peace. Under the relations governing the allies we are bound not to put

forth any terms of peace except in common agreement and after consultation with them."

But these men are politicians. So listen to Arthur Henderson, labor member of the war cabinet:

"Who are the people most concerning themselves about peace negotiations, who apparently would accept a patched-up peace of any kind? They are the enemies of this nation abroad, who are boasting that the allies have been conquered. They have been joined by a few mistaken people at home. Against all such talk we must be on our guard. We must see that peace is founded upon justice and honor. In spite of all the suffering and the unparalleled sacrifices we have been called upon to make, I am convinced of the utter futility and actual danger of peace talk at the present moment. We must guard against the danger of becoming weary and discouraged. The gallant soldier who recently found his death under such tragic circumstances warned us that it would be a war of from two to three years' duration. The end is not in sight. Let the enemy talk of our being a conquered people. We know different. Our armies are stronger, better equipped, and in better spirits than ever before, the relations between ourselves and our allies are more cordial, more closely cemented than they have ever been, and we are all of us more determined than ever."

Henderson represents a class of population that has contributed four-fifths of the British army.

Notice Inviting Proposals to Purchase City of Merrill Refunding Bonds and Water Bonds.

Sealed proposals will be received by the Recorder of the City of Merrill, Oregon, until August 12, 1916, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. (at which time proposals to purchase will be opened and considered) for the purchase of \$3,800, or any part thereof, of City of Merrill refunding bonds, payable July 1, 1931, with the option of the city to pay them, or any of them in numerical order, from and after July 1, 1921; said bonds to be issued in denominations of \$500 and one bond in the sum of \$300.
