Hughes Will Speak in Portland on August 16

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The opening rally of the campaign was held Friday night at the Baker theater, the principal speaker being James E. Watson, former congressman from Indiana, and candidate for the United States senate.

The theater was crowded, and many were turned away. Throughout the speaker's arraignment of the administration the crowd gave every evidence of approval of the speaker's remarks.

He charged that the prosperity now enjoyed by the Eastern states is due almost entirely to the trade in war munitions, and predicted disaster as a result of the Underwood tariff law at the close of hostilities.

Mr. Watson devoted considerable time to the Mexican question, and asserted that a firm and fixed policy would have obviated the necessity of the state of war which he claimed had existed between Mexico and this country practically all of the time that the present administration has been in power.

State Chairman McNary presided at the meeting.
