PASMORE SPEAKS
VOICE TRAINING

NOTED COMPOSER AND TEACHER
TELLS AT RECEPTION HOW THE
VOICE SHOULD BE TRAINED
CORRECTLY

Mr. H. B. Pasmore of San Francisco and Berlin has been the house guest of Mrs. Don Zumwalt during the past week. He gave a term of lessons in Iowa during June and July, and stopped here on his way back to San Francisco, giving a daily singing lesson to Mrs. Zumwalt and to several of her pupils. Mr. Pasmore is known internationally as a composer and teacher of the foremost rank, and his visit here is a source of congratulation to local musicians. He visited Crater Lake while here, and was delighted and surprised with its wonder. The climate here, too, was a delight to him, especially after having been in the heat of the Middle West.

An enjoyable reception was tendered Mr. Pasmore at the White Pelican Saturday evening. Mr. Pasmore's talk was highly interesting and instructive.

Mr. Pasmore said that he thought it strange that it is always taken for granted that a musician can make a speech. It reminded him of the story of the band master who was minus a flute player. In desperation he stopped a Yankee on the street and asked him if he could play the flute.

Said the Yankee: "Waah, I never tried; guess I can."

"Broadly speaking the voice instructors are divided into two classes: those who place the voice—that is, they work with the tone, trying to get their pupils to produce the tone in some precise way," said Mr. Pasmore. "In other words, they try to have the pupil's voice conform to the teacher's idea of what the voice should be—and the method of free action, which teaches that Nature has so beautifully created the organs of those whom she intended should become singers, that the pupil has nothing more to do than stop interfering with Nature's processes."

"The difference between the two procedures can be well illustrated by drawing two circles, one very carefully and the other off-hand. Neither attempt will produce a true circle, but the one that is carefully drawn will be stiff and cramped, while the off-hand attempt will be full of grace, and the fact of its being an imperfect circle cuts no figure."

"Personally, I teach my pupils to see a good tone, which gives them a sure means of attaining a fine muscular action of the organs of voice. If Lamperli taught by sight as well as by hearing, it is possible for pupils to learn to distinguish a muscular action that is certain to result in a fine tone, for beauty of the tone is dependent upon resilient, graceful action of the muscles of the tongue, mouth and throat. Anyone who will experiment with a mirror by making all sorts of facial contortions while singing, can convince himself on this point."

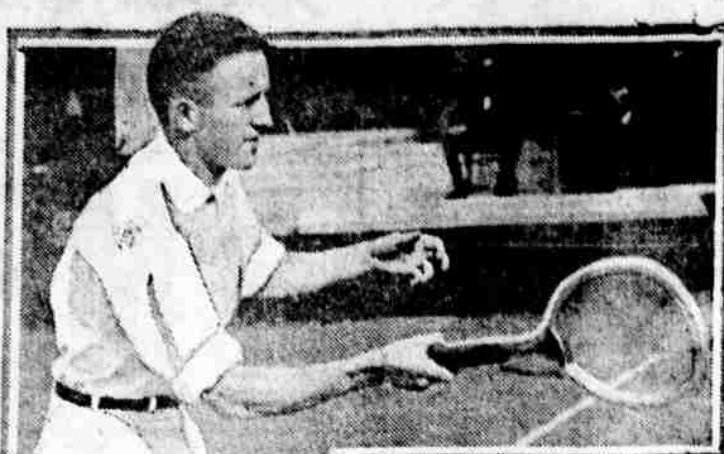
"Hence, if you would sing beautifully, have a happy face. This is not easy to do when singing high or loud, but rest assured that the tone will exactly reflect the facial expression. So, when you sing the high A, Mr. Tenor or Miss Soprano, you may rest assured that if the face expresses horror, it will be a horrid tone."

"Any you, Mr. Bass or Miss Contralto, draw your face down into a seak expression when you sing your lower notes, you may rest assured that the tone of your voice expresses—seakiness."

"One of the great difficulties confronted by singers lies in the fact that no singer can ever hear his own voice. Everyone will agree that could a lot of would-be singers to whom we are compelled to listen, hear themselves sing, they would never utter another note. The singer has to learn to hear by sensation, instead of through the ear."

"One can become a nice singer in a year or two, a very good singer in three or four years, and an artist in from seven to ten years. Hence, there
