Incidentally, his comedy in then inth inning, when he took the mound, furnished the fans with a few good laughs. Johnson, Clarke and Palmer had a good day at the bat, with two safe hits each. Bogart got one, and might have been given two, the ball being hard to handle.

At the end of the third inning it looked as if the game might be close, for the score was 2 to 2. Gold Hill had made two on an error and two hits, one a triple to left center by Shandling. The locals had made two when Bogart lived on an error, Nelson walked and Palmer crashed one to right field.

Put beginning with the fourth inning the lead of the locals began to grow, two runs being made in the fourth, fifth and eighth each. Every one of these were earned runs.
