WOMEN ARE STUDYING MILITARY
EFFICIENCY

499,850 American Women Take Pledge
to "Think, Talk and Work for Patri-
otism, Americanism and Sufficient
National Defense to Keep Horrors of
War From America's Shores For-
ever."

LAKE GENEVA, Wis., Aug. 18.—The
women rookies who are here in khaki
and military training so they can
"think, talk and work" for American
ideals have settled down to their rou-
tine duties and are making rapid
headway toward military efficiency to-
day. These women represent the 499,
850 other American women members
of the Women's branch of the Navy
League. They are under the direction
of Mrs. Vylla Poe Wilson, relative of
Edgar Allan Poe and militant Quaker
from Washington, D. C. She
originated the Women's branch of the
league.

"The league so far as we are con-
cerned has been organized little more
than a year," said Mrs. Wilson to-
day, "yet we have half a million mem-
bers. Mrs. George Dewey is president,
Mrs. Natalie S. Lincoln treasurer,
Mrs. Elizabeth Poe general secretary,
myself organizing secretary. Some of
the other prominent members are Mrs.
John Hays Hammond, Mrs. Alvah Will-
ing Astor, Julia Marlowe, Mrs. Gibson
Fahnestock, Mrs. Hugh L. Scott. Nine-
ty-five American cities are represented.
Hundreds of women wanted to
join the organization, but complained
that they didn't know how to do any-
thing; so we started this work."

"We know that with 17,000,000 men
of military age in the United States
that we would never be called upon to
bear arms, but we know we would be
called upon for aid in many ways if
this country ever goes to war, so we
are preparing. The pledge signed by
the women in the organization reads:
"I pledge myself to think, talk and
work for patriotism, Americanism and
sufficient national defenses to keep the
horrors of war from America's shores
forever. In these days of strife and
peril I will strive to do my share to
awaken our nation and our lawmakers
to the dangers of our present unde-
fended condition, so that we may con-
tinue to dwell in peace and prosperity,
and may not have to mourn states
desolated by war within our borders.
Insofar as I am able I will make my
home a center of American ideals and
patriotism, and endeavor to teach the
children in my care to cherish and re-
vere our country and its history, and
to uphold its honor and fair repute in
their generation."

The second term of the Lake Geneva
school will begin September 1st, imme-
diately after the close of the term now
in session.

ASKS THAT CLUB REFUSE HUGHES

STRIKING CULINARY UNIONS PRO-
TEST AGAINST DINING REPUB-
LICAN CANDIDATE AT OPEN
SHOP ESTABLISHMENT

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 18.—Represen-
tatives of the striking waiters' and
cooks' unions protested today to the
Republican central committee against
entertaining Charles E. Hughes to be a
guest of the San Francisco Commer-
cial Club.

The unions declare that they will
not support candidates who patronize
"open shop" establishments. The
Commercial Club conducts a dining
room and kitchen to serve meals on all
occasions when the club has guests or
when meetings are held in its quar-
ters. The club does not employ union
help.

Money Talks—But There Are Other
Speakers

In the September American Maga-
zine, "Mid" says:

"How would you like a \$25,000 a
year job? I suppose you think you
would like it a lot. But would you like
it? Would you enjoy the work you
would have to do in order to earn that
much salary? Would you be willing to
pay what it costs to become a \$25,000
a year man?"

"This brings us to an interesting
fact about the human animal—namely,
his way of pretending sometimes to
ambitions which he does not possess.
Ask almost any man in the United
States today whether he would like a
job paying \$25,000 a year and he will
tell you yes—vehemently and with evi-
dent sincerity. But in ninety-nine cases
out of one hundred he would not really
mean it. He would like the money—
yes—but to earn it by giving a corpora-
tion the price which it asks in re-
turn for that much money would not
suit him at all.

"In spite of the apparent lure of
money, the great mass of human be-
ings are not lured by it so much as they
are lured by other things. They think
they are, but they aren't. Men get
their orders from within themselves,
not from without. And often the in-
ward desires which control men are so
powerful that they make the 'mighty
dollar' look mighty weak. Frequently
laziness is in command, in which case
a rocking chair seems more valuable
than the presidency of a railroad.
Sometimes whiskey is the boss. We all
know men who sacrifice good incomes
in order to have lots of time for drink.
In millions of other cases men delib-
erately choose jobs which do not pay
well in money, although they pay
enormously in other forms of satisfac-
tion. Men are constantly deciding
against the scramble for money and in
favor of a quiet life, or a life devoted
to teaching or science or public serv-
ice, or a life devoted to some other use-
ful enthusiasm which has no special
cash value.

"The truth is that most men have no
taste for the duties that go with the
biggest salaries. The man who is
worth \$25,000 a year to a corporation
must be willing to work evenings and
holidays. He must be ready to upset
all personal plans if business calls him.
He must be ready at a moment's notice
to give up Sunday with his family and
spend it in a railway trip to another
city for a Monday morning conference.
In his office he must also bear the
brunt. He must be eager to take re-
sponsibility and be ready to make hard
and unpleasant decisions. He must
have real zeal for tough problems.
And he cannot hide behind others. Big
pay envelopes go only to those down
in front where the eggs are thrown."

War Censors Are Not the Fools One Man Presumed

LONDON, Aug. 18.—(By mail)—"The
censor is not the damn fool you take
him to be."

The above line was penned by a
British censor upon a letter from an
officer at the front to his wife, in which
an ingenious code was discovered. It
meant to disclose to the anxious wife
just where her husband was fighting,
but it was spoiled by the censor and an
order was issued by the war office
prohibiting such practices.

Before the officer who wrote the
letter left for the front he secured two
maps showing the entire British fight-
ing line. The maps were identical.
One he left with his wife and the other
he took with him. Thereafter, each
time he wrote a letter he placed the
stationery on his map, stuck a pin
through it directly over Paris, another
directly over Brussels, and a third at
the point where he was stationed.
Upon receiving the letter, his wife
would superimpose it on her map, ad-
justing the extreme pinholes over
Paris and Brussels, and her husband's
whereabouts would be indicated by the
middle hole.

This is but one of a score of codes
and secret signals discovered by the
censors recently. England does not
censure the relatives of men at the
front for wanting to know the locality
in which they are fighting, and perhaps
dying, but such disclosures became a
menace. No one knows how extensive
Germany's espionage system may be,
and England is taking no chances.

Another code system used by a cer-
tain officer was more elaborate than
the one pointed out by the censor,
with his "damn fool" notation. It was
arranged by the officer with his wife,
just before he sailed for France, and
consisted of two charts of the battle
line, one of which he retained while
his wife kept the other. Each map
was laid out in blocks an inch square;
each square could be identified by com-
binations of letters indicating each
line of squares from left to right.
Down the left hand side was another
row of letters. In writing home the
officer would say: Give my regards to
