CHILD PARALYSIS CASES SPREADING

NATIONAL HEALTH BUREAU REPORTS CLOSER SURVEILLANCE OF THE DISEASE IS ORDERED IN FORTY STATES

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 18.—Health authorities of forty states have organized for closer surveillance of infantile paralysis cases. They will require health certificates from all children engaged in interstate travel.

CHICAGO, Aug. 18.—Officials of the city health department admit that eighty cases of infantile paralysis have been reported this month. The spread of the disease continues. The situation is considered grave.

Sixty cases have been quarantined and arrangements are being made for quarantining more.

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tween Klamath Falls and Lakeview. Hence, in raising \$300,000 this community is not only helping to build a road to Bend, but is making a big start toward lines that will tap Merrill, Malin, Langel Valley, and all the territory east to Lakeview.

All railroad construction, as regards local lines, has been done on the initiative of the people and by voting bonds, as Klamath Falls promises to do, said Mr. Strahorn. He cited how Oregon City has raised \$150,000, Grants Pass \$200,000, Medford \$300,000, Newport \$100,000 for local branch lines, none of which opened up such a vast and rich territory as will be tapped by the Central Oregon road. He also referred to the action of Burns in voting bonds for \$125,000 toward a branch connecting with the main line; Pendleton, \$35,000 for a depot site only, and the contemplation in Lakeview of voting bonds for construction and terminals.

"The effect over the Northwest and

over the whole nation of railroad construction from Klamath Falls will be electrifying," said Mr. Strahorn. "Capital will begin to look toward Central Oregon, settlers will come this way and property certainly should enhance in value."

"We must all meet on one level for one thing: we each want to do what is best for us. It is our point of view or range of vision which will enable us to gauge the benefits and properly value these larger things coming out of a new railroad. Not only should the man of wealth be interested, but the man of moderate means should be a booster. The little help he will get from development will mean more to him than will the big help to the man of much capital."

"Now that I have on your urgent solicitation consented to meet your views on this matter, so vital to your future, let us all get together and make this railway building our one absorbing business. If we do this not one of us can fail to swell with pride in our future years."

E. Coman, president of the Northwest Electric company of Portland, and J. H. Burgard, a prominent insurance man of Portland.

The trip was made in two automobiles, the party returning about 10 o'clock. The local men who went were J. W. Siemens, E. B. Hall, S. O. Johnson, J. Frank Adams, Dr. E. D. Johnson and W. Paul Johnson.

The trip to the rich farming sections between here and the California line was not a pleasure jaunt. Messrs. Coman, Burgard and Fleischacker wanted to see the territory. The connection between their trip and the proposed railroad to Bend, with probable branch line to the Merrill country, was not stated by the men, but it is suspected that the connection is close.
