Opportunity and advancement has come to pretty Louise Lovely, star of Bluebird photoplays, in a great measure and far more swiftly than falls to the lot of one girl in a thousand who aims to make her way upon the stage or screen. Miss Lovely, star of "The Gilded Spider," to be seen at the Orpheus theater on Sunday and Monday, arrived in America from her home in Australia just in time to spend last Christmas in San Francisco. She had won her way in Australia, but the world war had halted progress, and to America she came for a free field and no favor. Applying to Joseph De Grasse, one of the directors of Bluebird photoplays, she was assigned three months ago to a minor role in "The Grip of Jealousy." Her work so impressed De Grasse that within a week she had been made star of the photoplay and had, within a few days won a place that most girls have struggled for years to attain. In "The Gilded Spider" Miss Lovely has a dual role that tests her talents in a different manner. She appears first as a buoyant Italian girl, dancing and singing on the streets and in public gardens of her native town. Later on (the role she first appeared in having passed through suicide) she takes up the character of a pretty model in the artists quarters of New York—and all through the piece her loveliness is the incentive for deeds of unusual daring and she is the prize for which men struggle to the death.

In "The Circular Staircase," the five reel Selig Red Seal play which will be shown at the Star tonight, Manager Houston believes he has one of the best offerings of the year. It is a mystery film, based upon the novel of the same title by Mary Roberts Rinehart, and features Eugene Besserer, the celebrated French actress of the Selig

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Seimerns Discusses Cost of Railroad to Taxpayers

counting the county taxes, which figuring on this year's levy would amount to \$4,400, or a total of city and county taxes of \$8,000, all within the city limits.

Now let us figure what his taxes will be in the county. The new line is supposed to be close to 100 miles long, and taking an average of what the Southern Pacific pays on, namely, \$17,940 per mile on the main line between here and the California line, \$8,970 per mile on the line between here and Kirk, and \$4,850 per mile on sidetracks, say an average of \$10,000 per mile, which is conservative, on which the Southern Pacific pays at the present time, which in the case of the Strahorn road would mean an increase in the county's assessment of \$1,000,000, which at the rate of the present levy would bring in \$22,000 in taxes, which would afford that much

to the relief of the taxpayer of county taxes.

Again, take the merchant who is assessed at \$5,000 on his stock. His share would be \$30 a year, or less than 10 cents a day. If this railroad will affect his business to the extent of sales of \$1 a day it will more than pay his share.

In conclusion, I will say that I heartily favor the proposed bond issue, and will close with my usual statement. I honestly believe that the building of this proposed railroad will bring forth what I have always contended, namely it will be the means of making Klamath Falls the second city in the state of Oregon, both in population and wealth.

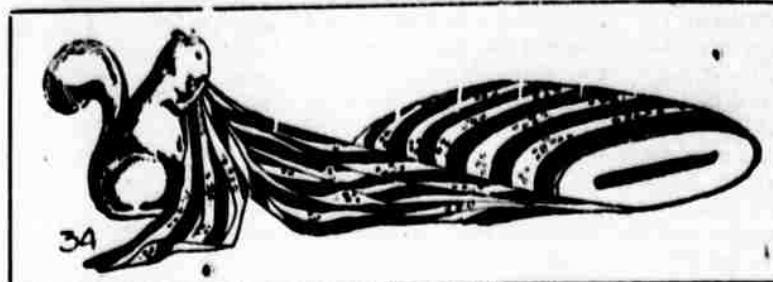
